

Mother of Nyssan Succumbs; Services To Be Held Today

Funeral services for Mrs. Martha Derinda Irby, mother of Nyssan Royce Irby, will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. today, June 10, 1965, at the Assembly of God church in Payette, with the Rev. A. E. Rainwater officiating. Interment will be made in Rosedale Park cemetery under direction of Shaffer Memory chapel.

Mrs. Irby succumbed Monday afternoon in an Ontario hospital following an extended illness.

She was born April 17, 1882, at Harrison, Ark., and on Sept. 27, 1905, was united in marriage to James J. Irby at Brandon, Texas. The family went to Payette in 1927 from Scottsbluff, Neb. The deceased was a member of the Assembly of God church.

In addition to Mr. Irby of Payette and her son, Royce, she is survived by two other sons, James W. of Medford, Ore., and John C. Irby of Payette; three daughters, Miss Cynthia O. Irby of Coeur d'Alene, Mrs. Leslie Wolf of Payette and Mrs. James W. Beat of Quesnel, B.C., Canada.

Also surviving are two brothers, two sisters, 19 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

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Elmer M. Sparks Dies of Sudden Coronary Attack

Elmer M. Sparks, 53, Nyssa cattle buyer, died in a barrow pit near the William Peutz home about two miles southwest of Owyhee corners Saturday afternoon.

It was first thought he had drowned when found face down in about eight inches of water but this was ruled out by Dr. David W. Sarazin, Malheur county deputy medical examiner, and the death was classed as a coronary attack.

Mr. Sparks was discovered in his car at the pit about 6 p.m. by Chet Mills, a farmer who lives nearby. Mills went for a tractor to pull the car back onto the road and on the way back stopped for Donnie Brewer to assist him.

When they reached the scene about 20 minutes later, Sparks was found in the water. They began resuscitation efforts while Mrs. Mills, who had followed in their car, went to the Peutz home and called for an ambulance.

Sparks had been under medical care for a heart condition for some time before and it was thought when he got out of the car he fell into the water.

Funeral services for Elmer Merle Sparks, a 40-year resident of Malheur county, were conducted Tuesday afternoon, June 8, 1965, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Sparks was born March 21, 1913, at Parma and for the past 20 years was in the cattle buying business.

He is survived by one son, Wayne Sparks of Adrian, and his mother, Mrs. Ellen Sparks, Boise. Other survivors include two brothers, Art Sparks, Nyssa, and Earl Sparks of Priest River, Idaho; two sisters, Mrs. Mildred Gridley and Mrs. Gladys Mull, both of Boise.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery. Pallbearers were Wayne Berrett, Orland White, Rick Moss, Francis Thiel, Francis Deffer and George DeHaven.

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Girl Scout Trial-Run Encampment Planned June 8-11 at Site Near Baker

With the International Girl Scout Roundup drawing near, 30 senior representatives of the Silver Sage council will hold a trial-run encampment June 8-11 on the Alvin Ward ranch near Baker. Announcement of the encampment was made by Mrs. Lawrence McShane of Nampa, public relations director.

To date, patrols within the group have trained separately and this is the first time they will all be together in a typical roundup encampment. Camping with the selectees will be 18 alternates from the council.

To carry out roundup practice as close to reality as possible, the girls will pitch tents, prepare previously planned meals on charcoal shepherd stoves and give patrol demonstrations, Mrs. McShane said.

The demonstrations, with all patrols participating, will stress songs, dances, skills, cooking or other activities typifying the campers' home communities.

Among patrols giving demonstrations will be the Silver Sage Sugar Spinners. Area scouts participating will include Caren Jackson of Nyssa; Susan Leigh,

Vicki Pryor and Diane Wyatt of Parma. They will show the making of beet sugar.

Each patrol has eight members and each has a special assignment which contributes to efficiency and comfort while in camp. A patrol leader and an assistant will oversee the patrol's entire operation, guide and direct activities.

Other patrol members are assigned duties such as equipment chairman, commissary manager, historian, etc. These duties have been carried on throughout all training sessions and will continue through the encampment until all equipment and records are filed with the council.

The pre-roundup encampment will be open to the public from 2 to 5 p.m. on Wednesday, June 9, at the Ward ranch near Baker, Mrs. McShane concluded.
