Former Nyssa Clergyman to Conduct Sunday Service at Methodist Church

The Rev. Floyd E. White will be guest speaker during the 11 a.m. service Sunday at Nyssa Methodist church, it is announced by the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence. Topic of his sermon will be "Bread on the Water."

The Rev. White and his wife, Ione, who served the Nyssa and Apple Valley churches from 1932-39 will be honored during the service in recognition of his retirement from the ministry.

Following the service, a potluck dinner will be held at 1 p.m. on the Apple Valley school grounds with the Whites as guests. Those attending are asked to take covered dishes, table service, portable tables and chairs. The afternoon will be spent in visiting with games provided for the children.

Biography Given

Floyd White retired June 1 after serving the Methodist church for 34 years. He was born Nov. 30, 1896, at Harrison, Ark., son of a construction worker and the only member of his family to enter the ministry. He went to Boise when he was six years of age and was graduated in 1915 from Boise high school.

During his high school years, he resided with a doctor and in his spare time operated a cattle ranch. He later became a distributor for a major gas and oil company and in 1923 he was married to Ione Fee of Payette.

After assisting in his local church as a layman, it was evident that his interests were falling into a definite pattern and he realized he wanted to give his full time to a church vocation. He then began to study for the ministry and his wife entered training for a career in education, a field she is still following.

Four Sons Are Ministers

The Whites raised six sons, four of whom are ministers. Another is a space scientist and the other is with a Florida steel company.

Floyd White entered the ministry "on trial" in the Idaho Methodist conference during 1931 and was appointed that year to Meadows Valley. The following year he came to the Apple Valley church. In 1933 he was ordained an elder and admitted into full connection. From 1933-39 he served both the Nyssa and Apple Valley congregations when the local church was located at the corner of Third and Main streets at the present Chevron station site.

After leaving Nyssa, the Rev. White served churches in Ontario, Union, Cove, La Grande, Vale and Joseph-Flora in Oregon, Indiana and at Paul, Idaho, since 1962. In honor of his retirement this year, the Idaho Methodist Board of Pensions presented him with an official pin for retired ministers.

To Tour Holy Land

The Rev. and Mrs. White were recently honored with a farewell party by the Paul congregation. The couple was presented a gift of cash which enables them to tour the Holy Land, a long-time hope and dream. They will spend some time visiting in the homes of their sons and then will leave on the tour, which also includes visits to London, Cairo and Rome.

The retired minister has served many posts for his church, including chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist conference, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, numerous other boards and committees. He has

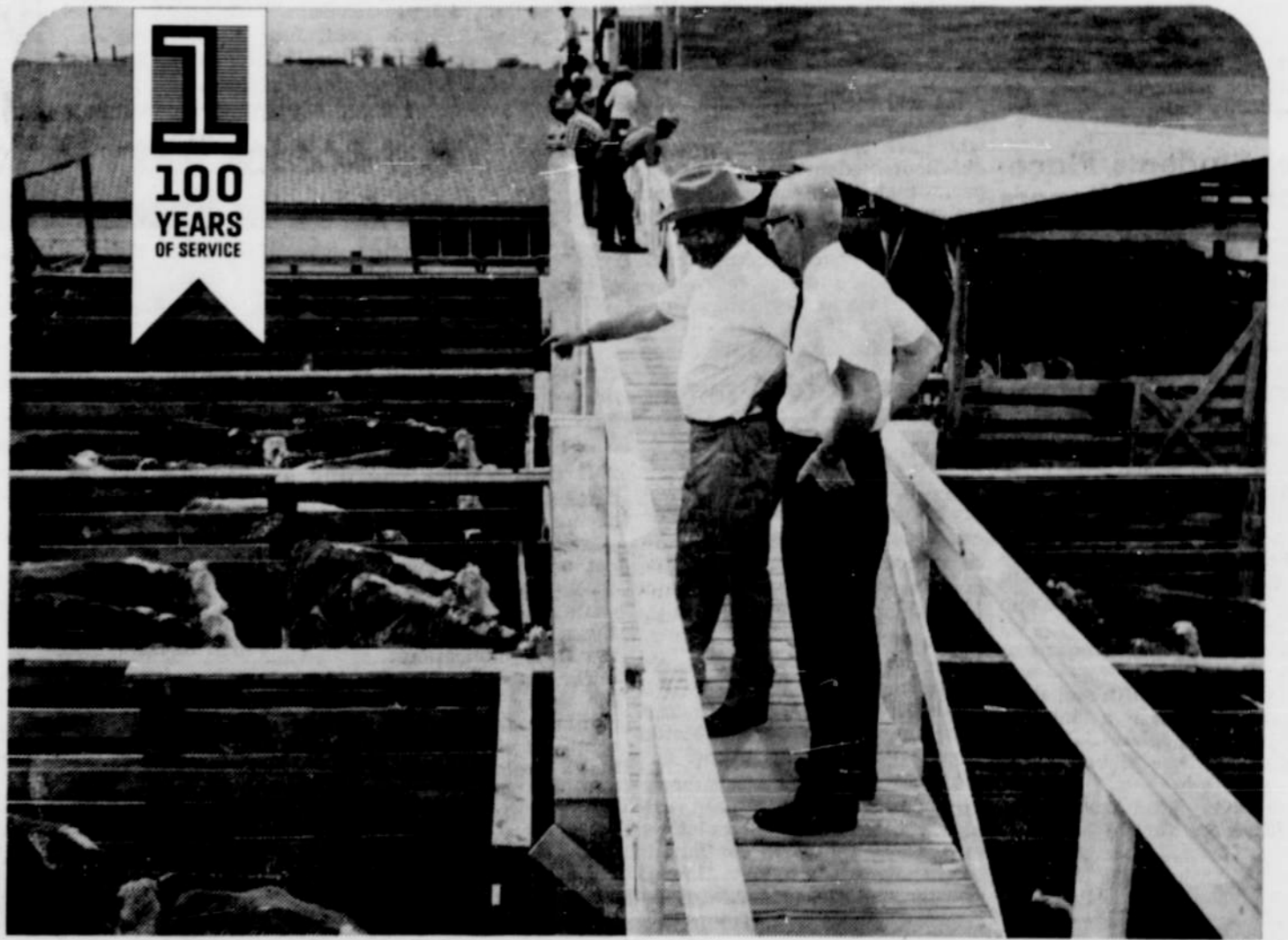
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GOING, GOING!
