### Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

**SOME FABRICS "PILL" OR "FUZZ"**  
 . . . when washed. You can discourage this by turning garments inside out before washing. Or, better yet, put the garment in a mesh bag before it goes in the washer.

Sometimes pills can be cut with the scissors or a razor blade but work very carefully. There is danger of cutting the fabric.

**BARBECUES SHOULD BE CAREFREE**  
 . . . but not careless. Don't spoil the fun by overlooking situations which could be dangerous. Wipe up spills when they occur. You may save someone from a bad fall. It is a good idea to keep a bucket of sand nearby for unexpected fires. And a first aid kit may come in handy, too.

**TAKING HARD-COOKED EGGS**  
 . . . along for picnic fare? Keep them in the shell until ready to serve, say home economists at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. After cooking and chilling in cold running water, put hard-cooked eggs back into the carton for convenience in carrying. In the shell, they keep at least a day without refrigeration.

**BRIDES**  
 . . . are you wondering what a reasonable amount to spend for food? Mrs. Alberta Johnson, extension family finance specialist at OSU, says that a couple with limited income can expect to spend about \$15 per week. If your income is considered "average," then \$20 weekly would be within your means.

Having a definite amount budgeted for food will help you plan and buy more carefully. You should earmark portions of your income for other basic expenses such as housing, transportation, health, clothing, recreation, insurance and savings.

**SEVERAL CHILDREN DIE**  
 . . . of suffocation in discarded refrigerators every year due to carelessness of adults.

Before leaving an old refrigerator where children might play, take off the door or remove the latch. The 1965 Oregon legislature passed a law holding the owner responsible for discarded refrigerators which have not been made child-safe.

New models are required to have doors easily opened from the inside. But most of these refrigerators are still in use in the kitchen and not ready for discard.
