Application of Salt Easy, Effective Way To Eradicate Weeds

During summer months patios, driveways and gravel paths are usually infested with weeds and grasses, and one of the cheapest and easiest methods of getting rid of unwanted growth is with common salt.

To save many hours of back-breaking work from weeds and grasses that have grown between cracks in patios or driveways, just place ample amounts of salt along the cracks and water thoroughly, but be careful not to flood area and wash away the salt. The salt brine kills the weeds as it seeps into the surrounding soil by drawing moisture from the root zone of plants, causing old weeds to die, and new sprouts never break ground.

Gravel walks and drives stay neat and clean when salt is spread evenly over the surface. Suggested amounts are two to four pounds per square yard. Again, water should be applied to dilute the salt.

Salt will also eliminate weed problems in play areas, such as tennis courts and sand boxes, as well as help to stabilize the ground and cut down on summer dust.

With construction brick, gravel, asphalt or cement paths, work a liberal amount of salt into the ground before the path is laid to prevent the growth of weeds.

An added advantage of using salt as a weed killer is that there is no danger of sterilizing the ground, and it is so harmless that children may even help apply it.

go" who has been awarded five silver mounted halters in Idaho and the northwest for his prowess in unseating would-be riders; a bull, "Big John" (No. 15) that weighs 2200 pounds and was ridden only once last year and once in 1963. This will be his first 1965 appearance in Nyssa.

Three Bulls From Mexico

"Blue Bell" is known as the fighting bull and can give the cowboys and clowns a rough time. Also three new bulls have just been brought in from Old Mexico and should help make the rodeo a top attraction.

Nyssa is one of 600 towns throughout the U.S. and Canada that will be offering this type of entertainment that began officially at Cheyenne, Wyo., in 1872 when the townspeople gathered to watch some Texans try to ride wild stock off the range. It was continued at Pecos, Texas, in 1883 when the Texas longhorns were penned on the courthouse lawns and roped on Main street. And it was in Prescott, Ariz., where they constructed the first grandstand for spectators and charged admission.

Produced Locally

The local people who are doing the work to make the rodeo possible are Nyssans, and like the cowboys draw no salaries or expenses. They are Tex Morgan, W. L. McPartland, Roy Holmes, Leonard Phillips, Bernard Eastman, Lynn Snodgrass and Bud Sappe.

Admission for adults is \$1.50 with children under 12 years of age, accompanying parents, admitted free.
