

Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

SUMMER PICNICS AND BARBECUES ARE FUN . . . but be prepared—some of the food may end up on the outside instead of inside. Stains should be treated immediately, because laundering sets some stains.

Soft drink stains are more noticeable after laundering or ironing. Keep a sharp eye out for these and sponge with cool water at once. Fresh grass stains will usually come out by rubbing with full strength liquid detergent or a paste of granular detergent and water. Rubbing alcohol also removes grass stain but it may fade some dyes.

For ice cream spills, sponge the spot with cool water. Then work detergent into the stain and rinse. If a greasy stain remains, sponge with dry cleaning fluid. Call your county extension office for information about other stains.

WORKING WIVES

Is it advisable to spend your earnings for wall-to-wall carpet? Only you can answer that. But if you are trying to justify the expense to yourself, then this research may help.

Tests in homes of young couples showed that carpeted floors took 20 minutes less care compared with smooth flooring in the same size room. Tests in hotels have produced similar results.

Researchers say, however, there is a tendency to underclean carpets. Smooth floors show dust, so they get cleaned more thoroughly.

HAVE TROUBLE GETTING YOUR CHILD'S ATTENTION?

Mrs. Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist, says to get down to his eye level, squat down, take his hand or make some other physical contact.

This will get him to pay more attention to what you say than talking at him from a distance.

WASTE DISPOSERS

get a heavy workout during fresh fruit and vegetable season. Don't put in rubber or metal bands that come around produce from the store.

Use plenty of cold water while grinding and continue for about 30 seconds afterwards to flush down the drain. Most instruction books warn against use of drain cleaners with a disposer.

KEEP YOUR SMALL FRY BUSY

With a "fish pond" idea, suggests Mrs. Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist at Oregon State university.

All you need is a box of odds and ends, some paper and tape or string. Let youngsters wrap items for use in a "fish pond" which can be behind the sofa or a big box. A stick, a piece of string and a safety pin will make a satisfactory pole.

The "fish" can be rewrapped and caught again and again, since the fun is in wrapping, fishing and in the suspense. The pond idea will provide happy times for two or three children. You might try this when you have small guests, too.
