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## Nyssa Restaurant Owner Succumbs Tuesday Evening of Sudden Attack

Funeral services for William Wesley "Bill" Kohl, proprietor of Brownie's cafe in Nyssa, will be conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, July 16, 1965, at Lienkaemper chapel. Pastor John Milbrath of Faith Lutheran church, will officiate and special music will be provided by Virgil Seward.

Mr. Kohl succumbed suddenly at his home at approximately 8 o'clock Tuesday evening after suffering intermittent heart attacks since 1960.

## Burglars Hit Two Nyssa Homes During Weekend

Burglars hit two Nyssa homes during the past weekend. The Fred Bennett home at 114 North Fourth and the Vincent Skubal residence near the end of East Main were forcibly entered.

Police Chief Francis Petrie said the Bennett home was entered Saturday night between the hours of 9 and 11 by forcing a window on the north side of the house, partially screened by shrubbery. The next door neighbors, Ray Huffmans, were absent from home during the period and the Bennetts were working at the Twilight cafe.

Petrie said both the front and rear doors were unlocked, making it appear the work of an amateur. Mrs. Bennett lost \$32 in currency and silver and some costume jewelry. One purse was taken and another, containing part of the money, was left in the house.

The Skubal dwelling was broken into some time Sunday night and since the owners were out of town, it was not until Monday morning that the burglary was discovered by Mrs. James Skubal, a daughter-in-law. Police reported entry was gained by breaking a glass in a rear door.

The house had been ransacked but as near as the daughter-in-law could tell there were no valuables missing. A complete check will have to await the return of the owners.

Petrie said he felt there was no connection in the two burglaries and that leads on both were being checked out.

## Local FFA Student Receives Trophy In SRV Better Farming Competition

Steven Jensen, a member of the Nyssa chapter of Future Farmers of America, has been presented a trophy as second place winner in the Better Farming contest within the Snake River district.

The young Nysson received his award at a July 6 meeting held in the local vocational agriculture building, with presentation made by District Adviser Tom Williams and State FFA Reporter Vernon Nakada, both of Ontario.

Steven received the honors after all applicants were interviewed by Joe Hobson of the Malheur County Farm Bureau and Jim Lissman of the Baker Production association.

He is a 1965 graduate of Nyssa high school and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Darwin Jensen. During the 1963-64 school term he served as secretary of the Nyssa FFA chapter and was vice president in 1964-65.

He rents 80 acres of farm land on which he raises wheat and mixed grain, with a portion being in pasture. Last year he specialized in row crops including sugar beets, alfalfa seed, lettuce and mint.

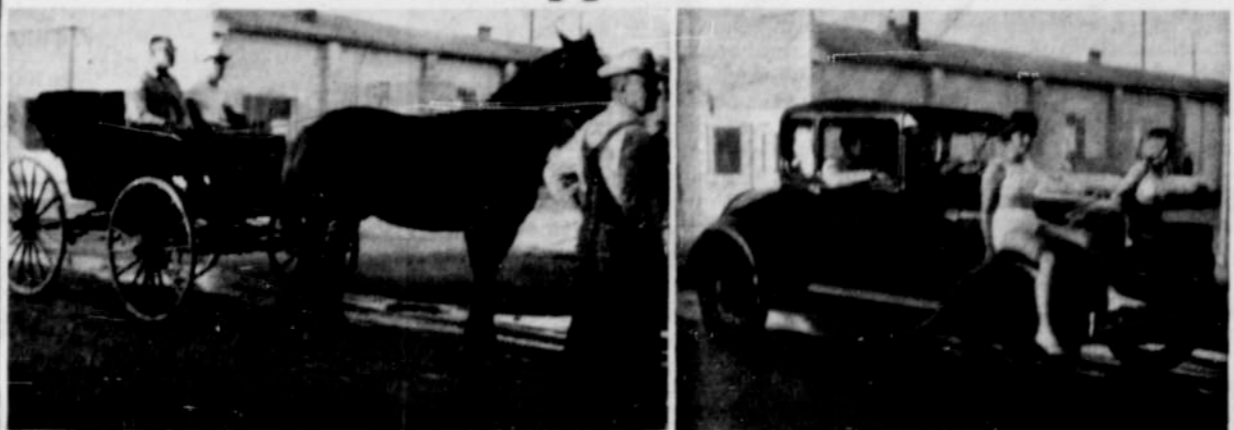

## Irrigation Water Use Restricted In City of Nyssa

Use of irrigation water in Nyssa has been restricted until further notice. The decision was made by the city council at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night in order to conserve water that might be needed for fire fighting.

The limitations become effective Monday, July 19, and provide that there shall be no watering on any days between the hours of 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and from 11 p.m. to 4 a.m.

Ehrgood avenue will be the dividing line with citizens living north watering on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, while those residing south of Ehrgood will irrigate on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

All may water on Sundays by observing the hours open for weekday use.

## FOUR STEP METHOD OF POLISHING STONES

1. FULL TUMBLER ABOUT 1/2 FULL OF ROCKS - ADD HALF OF COARSE GRIT - SHAKE TO SETTLE ROCKS AND CRIT - THEN ADD WATER TO WITHIN 1 OF TOP OF ROCKS RUN FOR 7 DAYS AND NIGHTS.  
2. THOROUGHLY WASH ROCKS AND LINER RETURN ROCKS TO TUMBLER AND ADD BAG OF MEDIUM GRIT - SHAKE TO SETTLE AND ADD WATER TO WITHIN 1 OF TOP OF ROCKS - RUN FOR 7 DAYS AND NIGHTS.  
3. THOROUGHLY WASH ROCKS AND LINER RETURN ROCKS TO TUMBLER AND ADD BAG OF FINE GRIT - SHAKE TO SETTLE AND ADD WATER TO WITHIN 1 OF TOP OF ROCKS RUN FOR 7 DAYS AND NIGHTS.  
4. THOROUGHLY WASH ROCKS AND LINER AGAIN - PUT ROCKS BACK IN TUMBLER AND ADD BAG OF POLISHING COMPOUND SHAKE TO SETTLE AND ADD WATER TO WITHIN 1 OF ROCKS - RUN DAY AND NIGHT FOR 7 TO 10 DAYS AGAIN WASH ROCKS AND LINER RETURN ROCKS TO TUMBLER AND PUT IN 1 CUP OF ANY GOOD POWDERED OR GRANULATED DETERGENT ADD WATER TO WITHIN 1 OF TOP OF ROCKS - RUN FOR 24 HOURS AND ROCKS SHOULD HAVE A HIGH POLISH DO NOT USE LIQUID DETERGENT.

## Near-Capacity Crowds Attend Annual Nyssa Nite Rodeo as 91 Contestants Vie for \$2,500 Purse in Six Events

Spectators Pleased With Two-Night Show As Cowboys Battle Rough Spur-Rowel Stock

Termed by many spectators as one of the best little round-ups they have ever seen, the successful 19th annual Nyssa Nite Rodeo ended Saturday evening with \$2,500 going to competing cowboys and cowgirls.

The two-evening event began with a Friday parade, followed by a rodeo performance and another on Saturday evening before near-capacity crowds.

Leading the parade were Queen Jennifer Gould of Ontario and her princess, Leona Sheppard, also of Ontario. Another princess, Claudette Stelling of Nyssa, was unable to participate due to the fact that she was in Malheur Memorial hospital where she underwent emergency surgery.

Her mother, Mrs. Elmen Leavitt, told a Journal reporter Wednesday afternoon that Claudette was very disappointed about the sudden change of plans, but she is now out of the hospital and making a good recovery.

Also heading the parade were flag bearers Bud Sappe, Tim and Leonard Phillips, Jr.

Among the 85 cowboys were some of the top contestants in the northwest who matched their talents against rough and tumble rodeo stock provided by Spur-Rowel company of Twin Falls. Six area cowgirls were also on hand for the barrel racing event.

## Parade Winners Listed

Following the Friday evening parade, a first place trophy for the most unusual entry went to the Dick Nelson family, dressed as Indians, complete with horse-drawn travois bearing a member of the family.

Sharing award honors in this classification was Harry Miner and his steam engine, pulling a platform-type vehicle on which were seated a number of the local band students.

Steven, Cindy and Damon Sage, children of LeRoy and Kay Sage, captured the first place award in the juvenile division. They were dressed as Indians, with the weenie, Damon, dressed as a papoose being carried on the back of his sister.
