Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WHAT ABOUT COLD WATER DETERGENTS?

Should they be used for all the wash? This depends on what's in the wash basket.

Some items benefit by cold water washing. Colors stay brighter and there is less shrinkage of knitted items. Cold water laundering can provide a longer useful life to many items such as elasticized garments.

With cold water, there is less wrinkling or setting of stains. But in any case, stains should be pre-treated with cold water.

Hot water is best for many items. It helps control bacteria and is important in removing heavy soil, grease and body oils. Cold water detergent can be used in hot or warm water as well as cold.

PITCH OR TAR ON BEACH CLOTHES

... will come off if you give it a rush treatment before it claims squatter's rights.

Lay garment, stained-side down, on several thicknesses of towel. Sponge back of stain thoroughly with dry-cleaning fluid. Work from center of stain toward the outside edge, using light brushing or tamping motions.

If stain is not removed, repeat this process using turpentine.

SPECIAL TO BRIDES

... who received electric frypans as wedding gifts: To keep it like new, remember this precaution.

Don't wash the frypan in water after cleaning greasy cooking utensils. If you do, a thin film of grease will cover the pan.

At first this doesn't show, but it builds up from time to time. As the pan is heated, the grease burns on and eventually a crusty brown coating forms on the bottom.

Always wash the frypan in clean sudsy water and dry with a cloth, both outside and inside.

THE NEW INSTANT FLOUR

... gets raves from most experienced cooks but is panned by some others. Why? We asked Virginia Weiser, extension nutrition specialist at OSU.

She explained that the problems women have with instant flour seem to show up when it is used in a favorite cookie recipe or pie crust. Both of these products depend on the right dough consistency for good results.

Doughs made with the new flours don't look and feel like those made with regular flour. At this stage, you might get discouraged and be tempted to add more water or try to roll out the dough while it is still crumbly.

Don't add more water, says Miss Weiser, until you've patted the dough together with your hands. It may look crumbly, but pressing it together usually makes it the right consistency for rolling out.

WINDOW CURTAINS

... on the sunny side of the house are likely to last longer if kept clean, according to recent home economics research. Sunshine is more damaging to soiled fabric than to clean material, the researchers found.
