State PUC Orders U.P. Railroad To Retain Service

The Union Pacific railroad's announced plan to discontinue its less-than-carload freight service to points in Oregon was at least temporarily derailed July 23 when Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill ordered the company to continue the service until Nov. 29, so investigations now underway can be completed and hearings held. The hearings will determine whether or not LCL service should be continued on shipments of 4,000 pounds or less.

The UP filed its plan June 21, to suspend LCL service on Aug. 1. The PUC immediately contacted shippers and other interested parties to learn whether or not the public opposed such a move.

Commissioner Hill revealed that a considerable number of letters of protest had been mailed to him. Hill also notified Charles A. Webb, chairman of the Interstate Commerce commission, that he had temporarily stopped UP's time table and requested similar action by the ICC. He said the UP intends to abandon LCL service in other western states, making the matter of interstate as well as intrastate concern. He pointed out that the state of Wyoming also is opposed to the plan.

"Less than carload freight traffic has been handled by Union Pacific since commencement of its operations over a century ago," Hill said. "Our records show that the volume of LCL traffic handled by Union Pacific in Oregon and revenues therefrom have not changed substantially during the past five years."

"In view of these facts and the public protests to abandonment of this service, Union Pacific should be required to justify its action. Therefore, I am suspending the proposed discontinuance of LCL service insofar as it applies to Oregon intrastate traffic pending hearing and investigation."

IN ADDITION . . .

The Journal last week reported that City Manager Fred O. Koch had been issued a certificate as a professional land surveyor by the state of Oregon. The article should have also said he was granted a certificate as a professional engineer in the state of Oregon through reciprocity with the state of Colorado where he had previously gained the title.

Gene Stunz Tells Of Global Study At War College

Gene Stunz, local attorney and a member of the Naval Reserve, told the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce members Wednesday noon of some of his experiences at the Naval War college short course in June.

The two-week course was held at Newport, R. I., and attended by 100 senior officers of the Navy and Naval Reserve with 100 civilians from many walks of life. The latter were composed of bankers, governors, industrialists, scientists, etc., and Stunz said purpose of the course was to study the global situation from many angles.

He said the Viet Nam situation came in for a major part of the lectures and discussions, and it was the consensus that it would be a long-range affair and would grow in area as well as intensity. He said he was interested to learn that other than the Viet Nam area of operations there were two other "C" (Containment) areas considered vital to the survival of non-communist countries. One is the Mediterranean sea region and the other the Caribbean zone, covering Latin America and the northern portion of South America.

Stunz said he believed that most in attendance at the meeting with whom he came in contact felt it was essential to fight a containing battle to keep Communism from spreading, and that regardless of politics most supported the stand of the administration to continue the battle.

He reminded the group of Communist tactics to get a foothold in a weak country, as in Cuba, and use that as a base of operations to infiltrate and take over other weak countries.

Stunz invited questions following his 10-minute talk and this proved interesting enough that most of the chamber members stayed for 20 minutes after the regular adjournment time.

Members of Local CAP Squadron Take Orientation Flight

Members of the local Civil Air Patrol squadron participated in a July 20 orientation flight sponsored by the U.S. Air Force. The group took the CAP bus to the Ontario airport and after strapping on their parachutes, climbed into a C-47 for the flight.

Aboard the plane were 13 members, including Nyssan S. H. Porter, commanding captain.

Each passenger who had never flown was given a chance to visit the cockpit. Following this, the remainder of the group took turns at the controls.

The orientation flights are only a portion of training given to the CAP cadets. They are taught navigation and weather, aircraft power and mechanics, reading of navigation maps and instruments, drilling and ceremonies, military courtesy, search and rescue tactics. They are also trained to be of more service to community, state and nation.

The Civil Air Patrol originated in 1941, eight days before World War II, according to Susan Boston, squadron reporter, of Ontario. It was established to operate the nation's light-purpose aircraft during combat.

It was first an auxiliary of the Army Air Corps and in 1948 became a private corporation and civilian auxiliary of the USAF, Miss Boston added.

Migrant Youth Dies of Gunshot Wound Near Nyssa Tuesday; No Inquest Held As Authorities Decide It Accidental

No Eyewitnesses to Shooting by Girl, 18
Who Reported Tragedy to Nearby Friends

Jose Lopez Perez, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tobias Perez of the Nyssa labor camp, died of a gunshot wound inflicted about 1:30 Tuesday afternoon. The shooting was ruled accidental by Malheur county law officials, no inquest will be held and no charges have been filed against Alice Garza, 18, also of the Nyssa labor camp and holder of the weapon.

There were no eyewitnesses to the mishap but according to statements checked out by police this is what happened.

The two youths, along with 12 other young people of the labor camp, drove about one mile north of the camp to an unused gravel pit for a swimming party. Upon arrival the couple, who had been keeping company, left in his car and drove down to the Snake river bank, approximately one-eighth mile away.

Soon after Miss Garza drove Jose's car back to where the others were still swimming and told them she had shot "Joe." They first refused to believe her but did return to find his body and one of the boys checked for a pulse beat. Some of the youths then raced to Nyssa city hall and reported the accident, while others called for an ambulance. Upon arrival at Malheur Memorial hospital Perez was dead.

Ruled "Accidental"

Miss Garza, along with all others, was questioned and written statements were taken from each. District Attorney John Hutchens, after checking the statements and conferring with Deputy Sheriff Dick Pounds and Nyssa Police Chief Francis Petrie, decided the shooting was accidental.

The pistol was a .25 caliber automatic and the property of Miss Garza's father, Servino Garza. She said she had taken the weapon without consent or knowledge of her father, because Joe wanted to see and shoot it. She said she knew nothing about guns and was trying to get him to take it back after he had handed it to her and asked her to fire it.

She held it with the barrel pointed toward him and in an effort to change the position of the gun, Joe pushed it away and it went off at close range. Gunpowder and threads from his clothing were found in the wound where the bullet entered the heart.

Funeral Services Saturday

Funeral services for young Perez will be held in St. Bridget's Catholic church at 9 a.m. Saturday, July 31, 1965, with burial in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.

The deceased is survived by five brothers, four sisters and his parents.
