Area Sheepman Dies After Recent Stroke; Portland Rites Held

Funeral services for Roscoe Green were conducted Wednesday afternoon, July 28, 1965, at the Chapel of the Chimes in Portland. He succumbed early this week in an Ashton, Idaho, hospital after suffering a recent stroke. He had been hospitalized for approximately six weeks.

Mr. Green was born Jan. 21, 1897, and had resided in Malheur county most of his lifetime. His father worked as a carpenter and also homesteaded about 1910 under the Owyhee project. This place is presently owned by Tom Drydale.

The deceased went to work for John Ward (father of Audrey Ward) at an early age. He later worked for many sheepmen of this period at locations in the Steen and Blue mountains as well as on many ranges in Idaho. According to his friends, he probably knew more range country than any man of late years. A more recent employer of the deceased was Vaughn Stringer of Nyssa.

When the family was living on the homestead, Mr. Green had five sisters, Florence, Inez, Frances, Edna and Goldie. In a recent letter to friends, Frances Atchison listed a Portland, Ore., address and mentioned the two older sisters; however, their whereabouts are not known here.

It has been said of Mr. Green that all of his acquaintances were his friends and he will be missed on the ranges of eastern Oregon and western Idaho.
