Relative of Nyssans Killed by Bandits In East Guatemala

James Frank Green, a 43-year-old helicopter pilot who had passed the million-mile mark without an accident while employed as a commercial pilot in Boise, was killed by bandits' gunfire in Guatemala, it was learned by relatives last week.

He was the husband of Shirley Corbett Green, a niece of Nyssan Solon Lewis, who with his wife returned home Sunday night after attending Friday funeral services in Logan, Utah.

Green and Luis Fernando Minondo, a Guatemalan employee of United Fruit company, were machinegunned to death Monday, July 19, 1965, on a banana plantation near Bananera in Eastern Guatemala. According to a government statement, bandits were to blame.

Until 1962, Green was employed for three years as a helicopter pilot for the Hood corporation in Boise. He then went to Central America, was stationed as a pilot in Costa Rica and five days prior to his death had been transferred under contract with a Guatemalan firm for crop dusting on United Fruit plantations.

The two men had just made a flight over the area and had landed when the attackers struck.

In addition to his widow, Green is survived by a son, Jeffery; his mother of St. Petersburg, Fla.; two brothers and one sister.
