Representative Smith Reports Highlights

The most significant tax package that has been proposed in the last 20 years was introduced in the House of Representatives and reached final passage this session. More than \$60 million was appropriated in various forms for direct property tax reduction. The House-sponsored package included inventory tax repeal, new capital gains provisions, head of household, student exemption and a four-cent a package cigarette tax dedicated to property tax relief.

Oregon will now have a long-range water study for the protection of its vital water resources.

The full-crew law was repealed bringing Oregon into line with 45 other states regarding the number of firemen necessary to operate trains.

A new Workmen's Compensation bill was passed covering an additional 200,000 to 400,000 workers in the state of Oregon. The bill raises benefits to the injured workman by 25½ percent and allows private insurance companies to write the insurance. This bill came after two sessions of argument and debate and was finally passed after the people rejected a monopoly insurance program operated by the state in last November's general election.

Legislation affecting our local area includes passage of a bill which will, for the first time, provide general fund monies for fire suppression.

It will now be legal to transport children to school and to go to town for groceries under a bill expanding the usage of the F-plate on farm vehicles.

Gas tax refunds to farmers and ranchers were simplified to allow them to report on their "on-highway" gas usage and receive a refund on the balance.

Local Bills Passed

Two bills affecting Malheur county passed. One provided for the appointment of the county auditor rather than an election and the other provided for validation of certain water rights in the county.

A bill which I am most proud to have worked on and to have been involved in its final passage was the meat labeling bill. This bill requires that all foreign meats must be labeled as to their origin before they can be legally sold to the public, not unlike Oregon fryers.

Several measures, too numerous to mention, were defeated which would have been injurious to our interests. All in all, it was a productive session for both the state and Eastern Oregon and I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for permitting me to serve you during the past two years.

Those planning to attend should take food for a potluck dinner and own table service.

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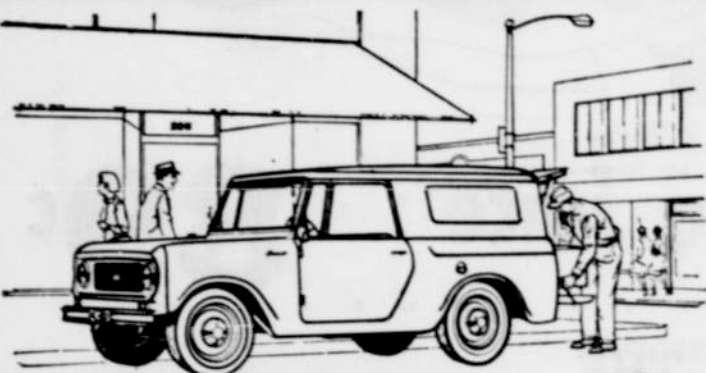
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
