DIVERSION OF THE SNAKE RIVER into a 40-foot-diameter tunnel at Idaho Power company's Hells Canyon dam project has been tentatively set for mid-August, according to an announcement July 21 by the utility. The diversion, designed to turn the river away from the area where the 320-foot-high concrete dam and its powerhouse will rise, is expected to be accomplished by a complex three-stage scheme illustrated on this aerial photo of the site in North America's deepest gorge. First a canal (No. 1) will be excavated to turn part of the

Snake's flow into the tunnel. Then a small rock cofferdam (No. 2) will be pushed across the river. The third step calls for two higher and stronger cofferdams (No. 3) to protect the work area during the two-year construction of Hells Canyon dam itself, indicated by white lines. Arrow near top of photo shows where water will exit from 1800-foot-long tunnel. J. F. Emery, Idaho Power vice president and general manager, said the diversion's start hinges on the completion of arrangements for river flow, power supply and other factors.

Home Appliance Costs Compared To Laundromats

Is it less expensive to buy your own washer and dryer or to use a self-service, coin-operated laundry?

With new 1966 appliances coming on the market, this might be an appropriate time to think about the economies involved in both practices.

This could be a particularly important question for young newlyweds, who are faced with the many expenses involved in setting up a household. The dollar and cents answer depends on the amount of laundry you have to do each week.

Owning your own washer and dryer is more economical if you wash and dry more than five loads of clothes a week, according to a study quoted by Bernice Strawn, extension home management and equipment specialist at Oregon State university.

If you wash and dry less than five loads per week, according to Miss Strawn, owning your own

equipment is more costly than using the coin-op laundry.

Cost estimates for the study were based on cost of electricity, water used, fuel to heat the water, detergent, depreciation and repairs for the washer and dryer. Self-service laundry costs in this study included charges for washing, drying and detergent, but did not include cost of transportation to the laundry.

There are other factors that enter into the decision to buy or not to buy home laundry equipment, points out Miss Strawn. A big factor is convenience.

The working wife may not have time to take the family laundry to the coin-op. Owning a washer and dryer may make it possible to get by with the smaller investment in household linens, since they can be washed quickly in an emergency.

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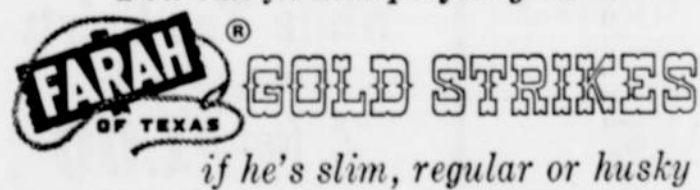
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
