

### Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

#### DON'T PUT WHITE WOOL SWEATERS

(or wool blends) in the sun to dry. They'll turn yellow and stay that way permanently. A chlorine bleach should not be used because it damages wool. Before you wash a wool sweater, lay it flat on a bath towel and outline the shape with a basting thread or pins.

Wool sweaters should be soaked in lukewarm soap suds. Don't rub, but gently squeeze suds through the sweater. Rinse in lukewarm water. Squeeze, don't wring. Lay sweater on the towel and shape to original outline. Dry on a flat surface away from sun and heat.

Of course, if the sweater is made of manmade fiber, this is another matter. Check the hang-tag or label for washing instructions.

#### SOME NEW FLOOR WAXES

... don't lose their shine when washed with detergent and water. You can put on fresh wax without scrubbing off the old, but the floor should be washed and dried first. Additional coats of wax increase the gloss.

After eight or ten coats, the wax should be removed. To take off one or two coats, use one-half cup of ammonia to a gallon of warm water, plus detergent. For more coats, you may need up to two cups of ammonia.

Spread the detergent-ammonia water over about one square yard at a time. Next, rub with a cloth to take up old wax. Repeat until all the floor has been cleaned. Then rinse thoroughly with clean water.

These new waxes should not be used on wood or cork floors.

#### NEW HOMEMAKERS

... You'll never have to clean a messy greasy oven if you do this.

Develop a habit of quickly wiping out the oven after each use. Just consider this along with your regular pan washing jobs. A roasting pan used over and over would be difficult to clean, too, but no homemaker would think of doing that.

It is the piling up of layers of grease burned on with each use that makes oven cleaning hard.

There are products on the market to spray on a clean oven to make the lining shun grease. These are not cleaners, but make the soil easier to wipe off.

#### MUSTARD STAINS

... come out if treated at once. Rub detergent into the damp spot, then rinse. If stain remains, soak in hot detergent solution for several hours. If safe for fabric, sprinkle a powdered perborate bleach on the stain. Dip in boiling water. Repeat if necessary.

#### "I NEVER GET CAUGHT UP"

... is the wail of many young mothers. But they shouldn't think they have a corner on this feeling. No matter what your job, you'll probably always think of more things to do than there are minutes in the day.

One statistician came up with this information about the typical homemaker's job. Every year, she washes an acre of dirty dishes, launders three miles of clothes, scrubs five miles of floors, washes one mile of glass.

Your family knows your most important jobs are above and beyond these, even though they might forget to tell you so.

#### BRIDES

... if washing men's shirts is new to you, here is a tip to keep the sleeves from twisting.

Try buttoning the cuffs to the front band of the garment. This prevents tangling and there will be fewer wrinkles to iron out.

Try this for your long sleeves, too.

#### WHAT'S A PICNIC

... without a good cup of coffee or lemonade? To prevent off-taste, keep your vacuum bottle in sweet-smelling condition.

After each use, wash it in warm suds. After rinsing, fill it with cold water and add one teaspoon baking soda. Leave the stopper out and allow the solution to stand in the bottle for several hours. Rinse with clear water.

#### PERSPIRATION STAINS

... usually come out if laundered as soon as possible in warm suds. If the color of the fabric has changed, try to restore it by treating with ammonia, if the stain is fresh. For an old stain, apply white vinegar, then rinse thoroughly.

If a yellow stain remains on a white garment, use a bleach suitable for the fabric. This could be a chlorine type except for silk, wool, spandex or certain resin finishes. For these, use a powdered bleach.

If color from a coat lining has rubbed off on a white shirt, then you'll need to treat it with a color remover. You can get this in packaged form at drug, variety or grocery stores.

For information on other stains, call your extension office.

#### SPRAY PRODUCTS WHICH SHUN GREASE SPATTERS

... on your oven lining make cleaning easier. But be careful not to get these chemicals on other surfaces in the kitchen as they leave a very slick finish.

Our county extension offices have had questions about removing this spray from floors. The OSU Chemistry department says kerosene will do the job.
