Principal Reports Registration Data For First Graders

Registration for youngsters entering the first grade this school year will be held today and tomorrow, Aug. 19-20, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. in the primary building, it is announced by Clarice Poor, grade school principal.

Parents are urged to register children in advance so that delay and confusion are avoided on the first day of school, Mrs. Poor said.

Springfield Baseball Field Named In Tribute to Former Nyssa Coach

Many oldtimers of Nyssa will feel a glow of pride when they learn of a tribute paid to one of their former esteemed coaches by the city of Springfield, Ore.

"John Young Field" is the sign now proudly gracing the entrance to Springfield's baseball diamond. No more worthy testimony could be afforded to a man who devoted his life to developing thousands of athletes throughout the state of Oregon.

John Young was Nyssa's only coach between the years 1927 and 1944. He handled football, basketball, boxing, baseball and track. Toward the end of his reign he was given an assistant for three or four years, but for the most part, he handled all sports without any help.

Produces Winning Teams

While at Nyssa, Coach Young's teams were respected throughout the valley. He was tops in baseball. Nyssa won the conference for so many consecutive years that some of the other valley schools actually abandoned baseball to concentrate on track.

Quoting from Dick Strite in the Eugene Register Guard: "Young's conduct on the court or playing-field has always been beyond reproach. His teams fought hard, but under his influence they also played fairly and cleanly. He never ranted and raved before his players or the spectators.

"He was a modest winner and a gracious loser. His players have always liked and respected him and those boys have become better men for having played under him."

Idaho Canning Co. Employing 300 In Capacity Run

Idaho Canning company's Nyssa plant is running at capacity, using about 300 employees in the two shifts, according to Manager Bob Moss.

Operations started Aug. 3 and runs have been steady most of the time since, processing what appears to be the biggest sweet corn crop in the history of the company for the Nyssa area.

Moss stated that quality of the corn is excellent; the weather, with cool nights and warm days, is ideal for growth and maturity of the grain, and that they expect to run at full speed until about Sept. 20.

Capacity Increased 25 Percent

Capacity of the Nyssa plant has been stepped up about 25 percent since last year. This crop has already been sold, Moss said, and payments have already started going to the growers. He estimated approximately this total would reach \$750,000 and will all be paid prior to Christmas.

The company has experienced some difficulty in securing enough laborers at times for the two plants, both men and women, Moss said, but that if it becomes acute the Nyssa plant will run even if the Payette plant is shut down. The local payroll will reach approximately \$250,000 for the seven-week period of operations.

Starlings are still a continuing problem for growers and Idaho Wildlife service has begun a study of the problem, in which it is hoped Oregon Wildlife will join, to find a solution, the manager stated.

Voters Disapprove Vale City Budget For Second Time

Vale voters rejected the city budget Friday for the second time since July 1, 1965. The tally of 185 against and 77 for was rather decisive that the \$29,476 outside the six percent limitation was not wanted.

The proposed figure included \$12,500 for a swimming pool. Without this item the budget proposed was still \$16,976 outside the limitation. Since the law does not permit another election on the budget for this current year, the council must cut operations back to an amount lower than spent last year.

Council members say it will mean curtailing expenditures for police protection, city streets, water facilities and sanitation.

NJHS Registration Scheduled Aug. 30 By School Officials

Registration for Nyssa junior high school students will be Monday, Aug. 30, the first day of school, it is announced by Muri Lancaster, NJHS principal.

Students' names will be listed on the bulletin board in the hall of the junior high wing, indicating at which room they are to report. All youngsters should know their addresses and bus students, the mileage from home to school.

Fees in the amounts of \$1 for books and \$2 for towels must be paid by all junior high students.

Insurance will be available at \$2 per year and covers the students during school attendance and all sports except football and skiing.

Health Group Names Nyssan as Chairman

The newly organized board of directors for the Malheur County Mental Health clinic met Tuesday night at Holy Rosary hospital.

During the session, Nyssan Walt Ford was named chairman; Joe Nysingh, Ontario, vice chairman; Ralph Bordner, Ontario, secretary-treasurer.

Meeting with the local board members were Jim Bradshaw and Robert Prairie, representatives from the State Mental Health division in Salem. The group discussed proposed operations and policies of the clinic.

Firemen Extinguish Potato Truck Blaze

Nyssa firemen were called Wednesday afternoon about 1½ miles north of Nyssa on highway 20-26 where tires on a loaded potato truck were burning. It is believed that the blaze was caused by the dual tires going flat and being run that way until they became so hot they caught fire.

Driver of the vehicle was not present and the blaze was reported to the department by a passing motorist. There was no identification in the truck; however, firemen believe the vehicle is owned by Kaz Yamaguchi of Vale.

The volunteers report no fire damage to the truck.

Council Approves Studies on Traffic Safety, Insurance Needs of City, Dog Control Ordinance; Approves Licenses

Stop Signs Erected Entering King Avenue At All Intersections, Making Through Street

At the regular monthly meeting Tuesday of last week city council members voted to approve studies of the insurance needs of the city, discussed a dog control ordinance and approved lodging licenses for the Western hotel and Buffington's cabins.

City Manager Fred Koch was instructed to make the study and review of the insurance needs, while individual members of the council were to make a study of what would be a practical solution for dog control and report to the next meeting for further discussion, and possible submission to voters at a later date.

A motion by Councilman Lee Dail, seconded by Councilman Walt Ford that King avenue be made a through street with stop signs at all intersections, carried. (Editor's note: The city manager says these signs are now erected.)

Blinker Light Studied

In the discussion regarding traffic safety within the city, Koch was asked to investigate the possibility of having an overhead blinker light installed at the intersection of North Main and Locust avenue. (This is the scene of the accident that took the life of Martin Greig a short time ago.)

In other actions the council approved the payment of \$23,927.82 for July accounts and accepted the 1964-65 financial report prepared by Rinehart and Tensen.

Oiling Nears Completion

City Manager Koch says city crews have finished oiling 3½ miles of city graveled streets and will complete the remaining ¾-mile next week. It is expected this will last two years and cut considerable from maintenance bills while also giving effective dust control.

Resurfacing of King avenue has been put off to a future date as the State Highway department rejected the original bids as being too high and there were no bidders on the second call. It is hoped that when a larger road project comes up in the area for bids it will be bid at a figure acceptable to the state.

City Calls for Bids On Well Construction

The city of Nyssa is accepting bids for the construction of two water wells in the city water system. Work contemplated consists of drilling two 12-inch diameter gravel-packed water wells, each approximately 40 feet deep.

Plans and specifications may be examined at the offices of City Manager Fred Koch or Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, consulting engineers in Boise.

Koch said the bids will be received until 8 p.m. on Aug. 31 when they will be opened and read.

Principal Reports School Information, Lists Supplies Needed by Grade Pupils

Mrs. Clarice L. Poor, Nyssa elementary principal, has asked the Journal to publish a list of school supplies needed at each grade level so that parents may purchase the items at their convenience before school convenes Monday, Aug. 30.

All students, both boys and girls, will need tennis shoes for physical education classes to be held in the gymnasium, Mrs. Poor states. The child's name should be printed on each shoe for easy identification.

Zipper-type notebooks are not recommended for elementary students. Regulation pens will be available at the school. Pupils are asked not to bring ballpoint or fountain pens.

Grade 5—Two No. 2 pencils, red-lead checking pencil, pink pencil eraser, box of crayons (16 colors), 12-inch ruler, two wide-lined spiral notebooks, looseleaf notebook with wide-lined paper (no zipper).

Grade 6—Two No. 2 pencils, pink pencil eraser, red-lead checking pencil, box of crayons (16 colors), 12-inch ruler, two wide-lined spiral notebooks.
