New books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 28, at Malheur county library include the following.

"The Addict and the Law" by Alfred R. Lindesmith. A basic contribution to the controversial debate on the handling of the U.S. drug addict.

"Dark Ghetto" by Kenneth B. Clark. Harlem is the focal point of a study growing from the Negro author's two years as chief project consultant for Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited.

"Hooded Americanism" by David M. Chalmers. A history of the Ku Klux Klan from 1865 to the present.

"The Agony of the G.O.P. 1964" by Robert D. Novak. A retrospective account of the last presidential election campaign.

"The Man They Wouldn't Let Die" by Alexander Dorozynski. The story of the great Soviet scientist, Lev Landau, who received the Nobel prize in physics, in person, eight months after he had been pronounced clinically dead.

"Be All My Sins Remembered" by Viscount Churchill. An autobiography.

"Rawhide Texas" by Wayne Gard. A social history of the people of Texas.

"Ghosts I've Met" by Hans Holzer. A book of poltergeists, clairvoyants, haunted houses and psychic experiences.

"Reading Without Dick and Jane" by Arthur S. Trace. Granting that there are mental, physical and environmental factors in the creation of poor readers, the author maintains that the basic pedagogical cause is deficient textbooks and methods.

"The Songs We Sang" by Theodore Raph. One hundred of the most popular songs sung in America from 1620 to the present, including lyrics and music.

"Thomas" by Shelley Mydans. A novel of the life, passion and miracles of Thomas Becket.

"The Tobacco Men" by Borden Deal. A novel of the tobacco industry based on notes gathered by Theodore Dreiser.

"The Penetrators" by Anthony Gray. An English military man

"Cedarhaven" by Patricia Campbell. A novel of the early Northwest.

"Hosteen Klah" by Franc Johnson. A biography of one of the last genuine Navaho medicine men.
