Who Pays the Bill For Bureau Blunders?

The bureaucrat seldom if ever is hit in the pocketbook for the mistakes he makes in the field of economic planning. The one who pays and pays is the individual whose business is affected by the wrong decision of the government planner.

When an individual makes a decision involving his own money, he has to take the consequences if the deal turns out badly. But when the government administrator makes a costly blunder in the realm of economic decisions, about the most he can lose is some political popularity or status. A true mark of a government bureaucrat is that if things go wrong with his plan, his solution is a more complicated program.

One of the prime examples of this seemingly obvious fact of political life is the cotton mess. There are many suggestions but little agreement about what kind of cotton program is needed. The consensus is, however, that the current plan has cost producers through lost markets and lower prices and has created bigger surpluses.

Consumers were promised lower prices for cotton goods, but cotton textile prices actually went up on the average. There is no question that producers are paying the price for Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman's wrong decision in raising price supports on cotton several years ago.

And who paid for the mistakes of the feed grain program and the dumping of surpluses on the market? The livestock producer paid part of the price of the cut-rate sales that artificially stimulated

production and resulted in lower prices a year ago. The corn farmer got lower prices for his 1964 production than he normally would have received in a drought year.

Who paid for Secretary of Wirtz' adamant refusal to permit entry of needed seasonal foreign labor in the fruit and vegetable fields? The ordinary farmer paid a good share of the price in restricted production or crop spoilage, but the consumer also paid in the form of higher prices.

Administration leaders who pushed the wheat certificate plan through despite the expressed wishes of producers are not concerned about who is paying the bill for this package of blunders. They told the consumer he would not have to pay for it, but he did through higher bread prices. And wheat producers have not been happy about what they got out of it.

Actually, government planners have a fine time gambling with your money. If they lose, you pay, and they have been losing quite frequently of late.

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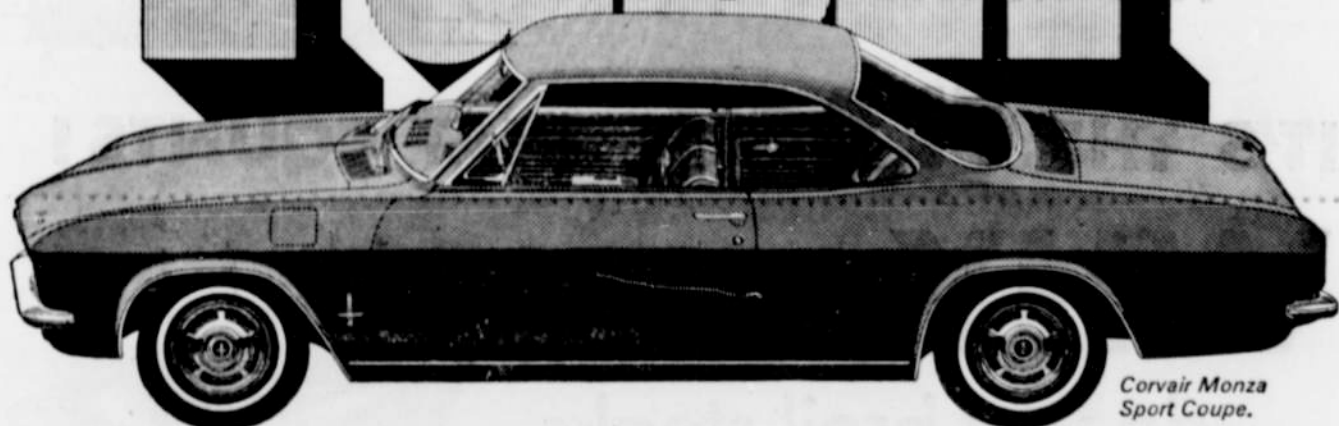
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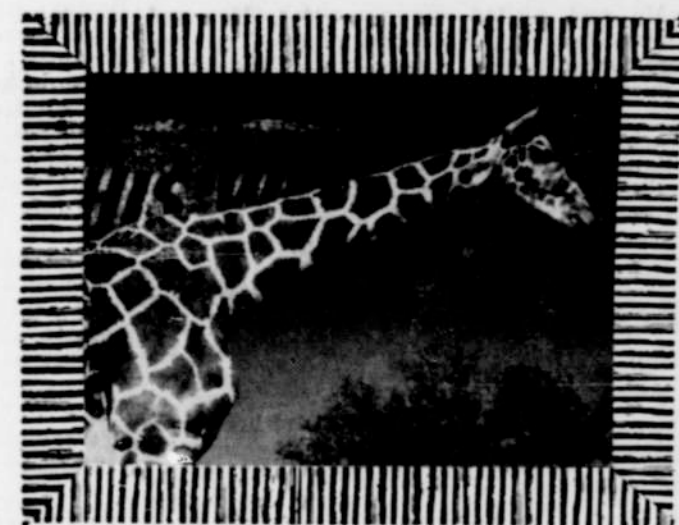
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
