Treasure Trove

The Ladies' Aid society decided to sell rag carpet rugs as a fund-raising project. Several ladies agreed to weave the rugs, including Mrs. Smith.

A member of the rag carpet committee left a box of carpet rugs with Mrs. Smith for her to weave into rugs. Later, as she was sorting the rugs, she found \$2,100 wrapped in the center of a ball of rags. The money had been neatly rolled and tied and then wrapped inside of the rags.

Mrs. Smith took the money to the Ladies' Aid society, told them of her discovery and turned it over to them. She also advertised in two newspapers to try to find the owner. No one ever claimed the money.

When there was no longer any hope of finding the owner, Mrs. Smith asked the Ladies' Aid society to return the money. They refused, saying that since it had been found in their rags, the money belonged to them.

Mrs. Smith sued for the return of the money, saying that the only reason for turning the money over to the Ladies' Aid society was in the hope that they would be able to locate the true owner.

Who do you think is entitled to the money, under these circumstances?

In such a case the supreme court of Wisconsin held that Mrs. Smith was entitled to the money and ruled that it was not lost property, but treasure trove. The court distinguished between money that is lost and that which is carefully and voluntarily hidden and then forgotten.

The title to treasure trove belongs to the finder as against all but the true owner. Mrs. Smith found the money and it belongs to her.

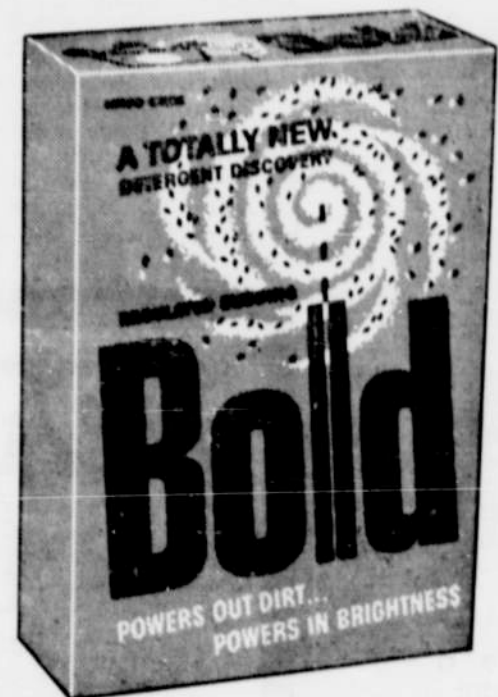
