Trusting Business

The trend these days is to suspect big business of being unfair in its dealings with the public. A new food investigating committee has been initiated in Washington to check on false advertising and improper packaging of foods.

A spokesman for the group, when asked if she believed in competition, stated, "Yes, but let's set a minimum level for competition and then compete from there."

There is one major problem with such reasoning. What level? The whole thing smacks of government controls of competition, leading into the control of both consumer and producer.

There is a basic misbelief in regard to the dealings of various groups within an industry.

For instance, in agriculture, some people believe it is the moral obligation of those purchasing farm products to pay as much as possible for the products.

The error lies in judging where buyer loyalty fails. Loyalty is based on competition, and the processor must put his product on the market in competition with other processors. The retailer must show loyalty

to his customers and his great forte is: "I can get it for you cheaper."

The original buyer of farm products buys as cheaply as possible. This does not mean he is an enemy of the farmer. He is simply competing and the results flow to the consumer upon whom he depends for his living as well as that of the farmer.

Processors do not particularly care how much they have to pay for the raw product. They just don't want someone else to buy it more reasonably than they do.

Can the government control supply and demand? Not likely, since growing conditions are variable. At least they haven't been able to do so in Russia.

Actually, the market is as fair to everyone as any scheme yet devised. Competition operates on facts. Farmers can enhance their marketing position by knowing how much product is available and in helping to create a greater demand. Competition takes advantage of ignorance, but then, so do government programs.

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
