The two-day event will be open to the public from 2:30 to 9 p.m. Saturday and from noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday. Entry deadline is 11

The show will be in two divisions, horticultural and artistic. In the horticultural division, all entries must have been grown by the exhibitor with only one entry made in any one class. Entries must be exhibited in clear glass containers.

Artistic Class Entries

"Nature's Royalty" is theme for the show's artistic division, and will be comprised of several classifications. Materials used need not be grown by exhibitor; however, mums must predominate in all classes; no artificial flowers or leaves will be permitted and accessories may be used.

Artistic classifications include "Nature's Royalty," using mums with vacation treasures from land or sea; "The Queen's Jewels," any material; "The Graceful Princess," mums in pastel shades.

"The Gallant Prince," a vertical—tall, dark and handsome; "Lilliput Fantasy," small—eight inches or under, overall; "Court Elegance," Oriental influence; "The Court Jester Performs," kitchen utensil container or accessory.

The public is invited to participate and to view the display. There is no entry fee, nor admission charge. Information and schedules are available from any of the committee chairmen.
