Ullman this year will nominate young men to the Naval, Military and Merchant Marine academies. Basis for selection of nominees will be the recommendations of school officials and results of the competitive Civil Service examination.

The test will be given on Nov. 6 in the cities of Baker, Bend, Burns, Enterprise, John Day, Hermiston, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Lakeview, Prineville, Pendleton, The Dalles and in Caldwell and Weiser, Idaho.

Testing can be arranged in other areas of the state or country to accommodate Second district residents who are away from home. Requests to take part in this competition must be received in the congressman's office by Oct. 16.

To be eligible, an applicant must be between the ages of 17 and 22, unmarried, of good moral character, in good physical condition, capable of college level work and a legal resident of the Second district of Oregon. Young men now serving in the Armed Forces are also eligible.
