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United States Jaycee Units Advocate 'Stay-Tough' Policy Toward Vietnam

According to a news release given to the Journal by Ray Tarter, Nyssa Jaycee publicity chairman, President Johnson learned during a recent White House conference that the U. S. Jaycees advocate a stay-tough policy in Vietnam.

James A. Skidmore Jr., president of the United States Jaycees reported to the president that the young man's civic group endorsed this policy through a recently completed referendum vote of the Jaycee's 5,700 chapters in 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The 33-year-old civic leader told President Johnson the Jaycees took this stand because they realize that "to achieve victory over communist aggression, force as well as diplomatic resources are often necessary."

The 260,000-member Jaycee group was the first organization to give full endorsement to the peace time draft in 1940.

Organization Fears War
"Now, as in 1940, we do not find it easy to enter into conflict. We fear war more than anyone, for it directly affects the lives of our members, the young men of America," said the Jaycee president.

"More than 92 percent of our members are veterans and young men who will be called upon to defend their nation," added Skidmore.

Submitted to the Jaycees by the organization's 18-member executive committee, the referendum gave each member the opportunity of favoring a stay-tough policy in Vietnam, opposing it or taking no stand on the issue. Voting as chapter units in 5,700 communities, the referendum logged a yes vote by a 12-1 ratio.

For Benefit of People
"Our referendum pointed out that responsible action in Vietnam using military force, diplomacy and all other public and private resources to protect these principles is for the ultimate benefit of all freedom-loving people.

"As long as there are men who hate and destroy, this nation must continue to have the cour-

Local Minister Selected to Conduct Evangelistic Mission in North Dakota

Pastor John Milbrath of Faith Lutheran church was recently selected as one of 85 ministers to conduct a two-week evangelistic mission. The clergymen were named from the roster containing the names of 5,000 pastors of the American Lutheran church.

Pastor Milbrath left Wednesday morning by plane from Boise for Minneapolis, Minn., for an orientation period preceding the evangelistic sessions. He plans to leave there Saturday for Grand Forks, N. D., and will conduct an Oct. 17-21 evangelistic mission at South Trinity Lutheran church in Hoople, a suburb of Grand Forks.

From there the Nyssa pastor will travel to Minot, N. D., to conduct services at Trinity Lutheran church in that city. Emphasis of the evangelistic missions will be primarily on person-to-person witnessing, Pastor Milbrath said.

During the past four years the American Lutheran church Commission on Evangelism has chosen parish pastors to serve as preaching evangelists for two-week periods. The parish-pastor evangelist idea is a way of multiplying this work of evangelism to many congregations.

According to all experiences of the past, there are distinct blessings that come to the congregations visited, to the pastor-evangelists and to their congregations when they return home.

Pastor Milbrath expects to return to Nyssa on Oct. 29.
