'Hand-Me-Downs' Should Fit Well, OSU Expert Says

Do children resent "hand-me-down" clothing? It seems to be a common belief that they do, but this is not always true, according to Elaine Carlson, extension clothing and textiles specialist at Oregon State university.

Miss Carlson points out that children are often happy to receive such clothing, particularly if it has been worn by a person they like. A family with several children may find it economical and practical to hand down good items of clothing from one child to the next as long as the clothes are of good quality and haven't gone out of style.

However, shoes should never be passed on from one child to another, since they shape themselves to each individual's feet and can harm the next child's foot.

Making over clothing from either knitted or woven fabric is an excellent way to extend the family clothing budget and provide a larger wardrobe for your child, according to Miss Carlson.

Coats are rather commonly made-over, but many garments can be successfully altered to fit another child. Many attractive knitted articles can be made for children from old sweaters. There are no set rules for remaking garments, points out Miss Carlson. Each one is a special challenge for the seamstress' skill and ingenuity.

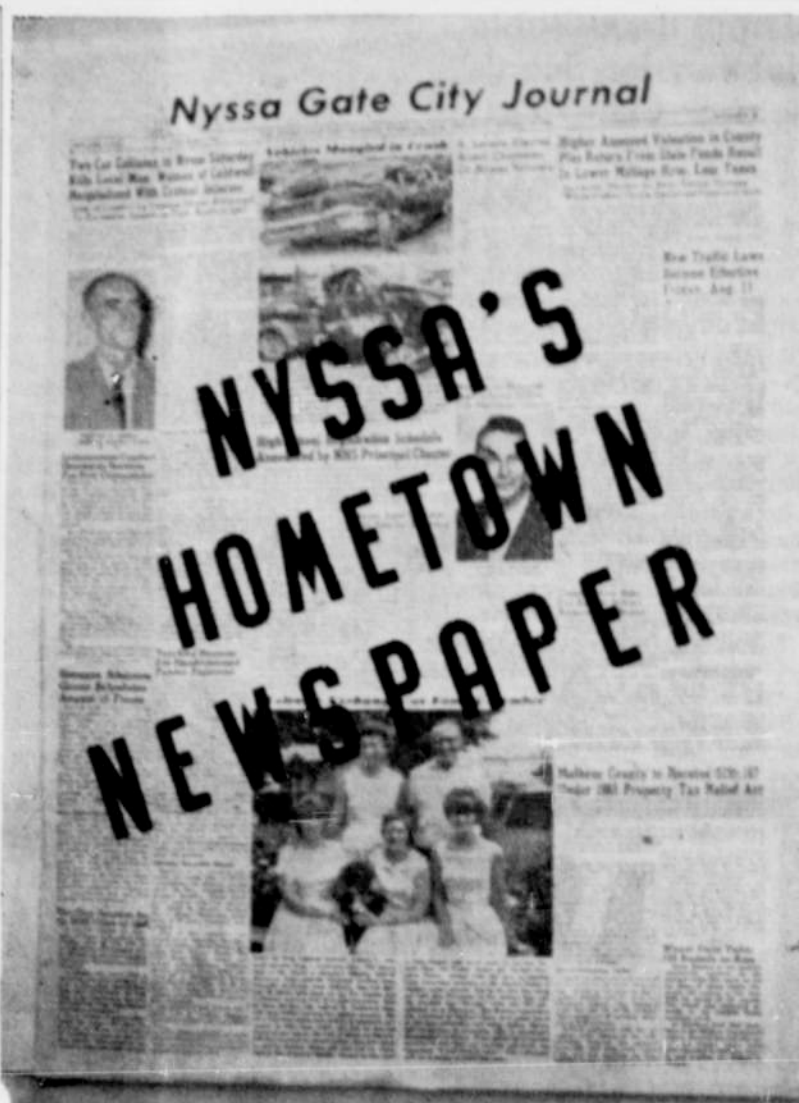

"The Teacher of the Mentally Retarded" by Leon Charney. A guide to careers in special education.

"Understanding the Mentally Retarded" by Gareth David Thorne. Insight into the problem for the attendant and others directly concerned with the care of the retarded.

"Psychology of Exceptional Children and Youth" by William M. Cruickshank. A practical guide for parents, educators and psychologists in the field of exceptional children.

Next card party will be held Oct. 23 and the public is cordially invited to attend.

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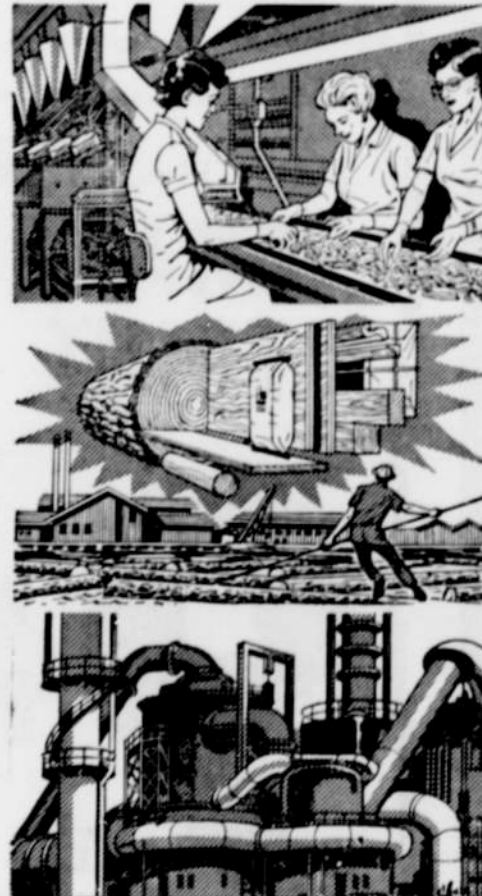

Value Added by Idaho Manufacturing

Grows to \$365,695,000 in 1963 — Up 233% in 16 Years

Remarkable strides forward have been made by Idaho manufacturing. Whereas value added by manufacture in Idaho amounted to \$31,770,000 for the year 1939, and advanced to \$109,694,000 in the post-war year of 1947, it reached \$365,695,000 in 1963 according to latest official data.

These are most impressive figures, and they demonstrate again that Idaho's economy is moving upward—faster than you may have thought. There now are more than 1,100 manufacturing establishments in the state, employing some 31,000 people and providing a payroll annually in excess of \$162 million.

Idaho's largest manufacturing activity is in the field of food products. It accounted for \$110 million of added value for the year 1963. Lumber and wood products manufac-

ture produced \$89 million.

Chemicals and allied products, relatively new to Idaho's processing economy, has become a giant industry. Its value added by manufacturing in 1963 was \$76,537,000, which is a vast increase over its 1947 amount of \$1,609,000.

Solid achievement like this is a prelude to Idaho's future. With its remarkable abundance of natural resources, its soil, water and "elbow room" for growth, Idaho's economy is merely on the threshold of accomplishing its potential. More and more people are discovering this fact every year.

Low-cost electric power in steadily increasing quantities from Snake river hydro plants is a partner in Idaho progress. It's plentiful for every need.

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
