

City Librarian Reviews New Books Recently Added for Area Circulation

Mrs. Max W. Urry, Nyssa city librarian, reports the following new books are now available to area patrons.

ADULT READING

"The Moment of Wonder" A collection of Chinese and Japanese poetry including as well many haiku, the three-line verses that sketch a scene, a mood or an exquisite image, which the reader then colors with his imagination.

"Mother Goose in French" — Translations by Hugh Latham.

"Black Like Me" by John Howard Griffin. The author undertook in the fall of 1959 a personal assignment to find out the hard way, possibly the only way a white man can, what it is like to be a Negro in the South.

"Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl." Anne Frank and her family originally lived in Germany, but during the early '30's when Hitler came to power, they migrated to Holland. But when the Nazis occupied Holland, the family was forced to flee again because they were Jews. This book is about members of the family and their friends during the time they were hiding.

"Airs Above the Ground" by Mary Stewart. What promised to be no more than a delicate mission turns out to involve the security forces of three countries, two dead men, a circus and its highly colored personnel, and many others.

"Death in the Castle" by Pearl S. Buck. In this novel set in an ancient and brooding English castle, Pearl S. Buck once more shows her versatility as a storyteller.

"One Touch of Nature" by B. J. Chute. Here, in the first collection of her short stories since *The Blue Cup*, is further proof of Miss Chute's mastery of the art of fiction.

"The Lonely Breeze" by Van Siller. Pat Cunningham hadn't counted on murder when she accepted Novelist Katrinka Medford's invitation to spend Christmas in Florida. An interesting outcome with Pat solving the identity of the killer.

"The Penetrators" by Anthony Gray. This is a subject so hot, so controversial, so vital to our national security that it could only be handled as fiction.
