

Vale Vikings Overpower Nyssa 41-7 To Cancel Bulldogs' Tourney Hopes

Vale gained the right to journey to state by defeating the Nyssa Bulldogs 41-7 on the Vikings' home gridiron Friday, Oct. 15. Nyssa kicked off to the Vale lads and held them, regaining the ball on their own 20-yard line.

Vale's defense crushed the Bulldogs' offensive drive. Vale took control of the ball and the Vikings' quarterback, Perry, completed a 41-yard pass to Camman for the first score of the game.

In the second quarter Vale's ace running back, Kamo, scored twice, once on a 7-yard sprint and again on a 3-yard run. Bates of Vale successfully kicked the extra point after the first two touchdowns but failed on the third after a successful kick was called back on illegal procedure.

At the end of the first half the score was Vale 20, Nyssa 0.

Vale Continues Scoring
In the third quarter Vale's defense halted any attempt by the Bulldogs to build up an offense.

TVCC Chukars Win Homecoming Contest Against SOC Squad

The Treasure Valley Community college Chukars won their homecoming game against the Southern Oregon college Jayvees by a 20-12 final score last Friday evening at Ontario high school stadium.

The Chukars scored the 20 points in the first half of the contest, then played defensive ball to hold the lead.

John Stavros opened the scoring for TVCC with a 12-yard run in the first quarter and Don Luisi ran the conversion when the pass from center went wide. In the second stanza, Luisi ran 13 yards for the second touchdown but the PAT was not completed.

Also scoring for TVCC in the second quarter was Dave Tash who went six yards into the end zone. Bill Cooper booted the point and the score stood 20-6 at half-time.

In the final period, SOC tallied six points on an eight-yard aerial from Knight to Fraser. Their first touchdown came early in the first quarter and both conversions were blocked by the Chukars.

Stavros ran 54 yards rushing to lead the TVCC club and Jimmy Nolan intercepted five SOC passes in outstanding defensive play. The Chukars' season record stands at 3-2. They travel to Yakima Saturday and will meet the Yakima JC club that night.

Poison Bait Placed By County Trappers

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife service in cooperation with Malheur county, the Oregon State Department of Agriculture and the Oregon State Game commission, is now placing lethal bait stations in Malheur county for the control of predatory animals for the protection of livestock and game.

OSU Issues Weed Control Guides For Seed Crops

Proper application of herbicides is one of the most effective and economical ways of controlling weed seeds and keeping unwanted crop seeds out of many Oregon seed lots.

Rex Warren, Oregon State university extension farm crops specialist, lists recommended chemicals and instructions for application in a new OSU Fact Sheet.

"Diuron, simazine, atrazine and prometryne must be applied when the weeds to be killed are in the seedling stage of growth," says the author. "These chemicals do not, at selective rates, kill established plants, even annuals."

Since straw and chaff from harvested crops reduce effectiveness of all herbicides, straw should be removed by burning or other mechanical means, it was noted.

"It is advisable," points out Warren, "to alternate the use of herbicides each year. Such changes help prevent buildup to tolerance of certain chemicals by the plants."

The revised fact sheet has tips on uniform herbicide applications and applications that can act as soil sterilants if not handled correctly.

In addition, Warren notes that proper applications of IPC and 2,4-D, or paraquat, can aid in the establishment of new grass seed fields because these chemicals help to control seedling grasses and broadleaf plants which compete with crop seedlings.

Nyssa Salesman Suffers Wounds From Gun Blast

Fran Dols, 240 NW Tenth, Ontario, sales representative for Cascade Natural Gas, suffered minor injuries from an accidental gunshot wound about 4:45 p.m. Sunday in Ontario.

The accident happened only about two blocks from his home and could easily have been fatal, but after being treated at the hospital he was released and sent home.

According to the salesman, who works the Nyssa territory, he, his wife and three sons had gone deer hunting in their pickup camper for the weekend. Failing to get a deer, they were looking for chukars along the road on the return home.

One of the boys had a 410 single shot, bolt-action shotgun in which he had placed a shell with the gun open, in order to be nearer ready if chukars were sighted. None were and the gun was placed inside a sleeping bag to keep it clean.

Upon nearing their home, the boys in the camper began collecting gear to unload. One of the lads pulled on the 410 in the sleeping bag upon a shelf and it was caught. On the second tug, it fired and hit Dols in the back of the neck from a distance of only 14 inches.

Nine of the number six shot penetrated the back of his neck, but after it had gone through a four-inch pillow and the glass in the back window of the pickup. He never lost consciousness and drove to the hospital where he was treated.

Dols said his boys were trained better than this and that they were highly embarrassed over it and wanted no publicity. But, upon being reminded that it might be a deterrent for similar accidents, he kindly consented for the Journal to carry the story.
