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**FARM BUREAU FURROW**

**Giant Giveaway?**

Farm price support and control legislation receiving the most attention currently in Congressional committees is largely an extension of old, threadbare and ineffective programs. But recently there has been some speculation in newspapers that a gigantic food-for-peace program may eventually be proposed as a replacement for current control programs by the administration.

President Johnson is faced with the task of finding money to pay for the expanded welfare programs that occupy a major role in the establishment of the Great Society and still keep his budget around the \$100 billion mark.

As farm price support and control program costs continue to soar and surpluses continue to pile up, the administration finds itself in an embarrassing position.

At first glance, it would appear that a giveaway program would be a handy out for the bureaucrats who refuse to admit the obvious failure of price support and control programs.

Disposal of surpluses also would lift a burden from the market and should afford a better opportunity for operation of the market price system.

At the same time there are numerous and potentially dangerous pitfalls. If farmers were guaranteed a so-called parity price through government purchases or payments, it would mean more dependence than ever on the federal treasury for producers' income. And it is difficult to see how costs would be reduced under such a program.

Also, there is the question of what a bigger giveaway program would do to trade relationships and the long-run welfare of the needy countries. P. L. 480 sales have encouraged foreign recipients to slight their own agriculture and thus become dependent on U. S. aid.

They have replaced dollar sales and have diverted attention from the need to meet foreign competition in the dollar market. The net effect has been to decrease aggressive sales efforts.

Perhaps administration leaders might even consider expansion of current price support programs to meet the needs of an extensive food-for-peace program rather than as a replacement.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman made this suggestion in the fall of 1963 when he said: "Is it possible that there is enough support for food-for-peace so that, instead of gearing (and limiting) our food-for-peace activities to commodity programs, we might gear our commodity programs to the needs of food-for-peace?"
