Nyssa Chapel Rites Held Wednesday For Mrs. Klinkenberg

Funeral services for Margaret Ann Sumpter Klinkenberg were conducted Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 10, 1965, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mrs. Klinkenberg succumbed Sunday at Malheur Memorial hospital where she had been a patient in the nursing home wing since January.

She was born Oct. 29, 1878, in Missouri, a daughter of William D. and Emma Frances Callison Sumpter. At the age of four years she moved with her parents to the Puget Sound area in Washington.

On July 7, 1901, she was united in marriage to Cornelius Klinkenberg. The family resided in Tacoma, moved to the Burns area in 1910 and came to Nyssa seven years later.

The deceased was a member of the Methodist church and a past member of Rebekah lodge.

Survivors include four sons, Gilbert and Lester of Nyssa, Marion of Portland and William Klinkenberg of Sebastopol, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. Frances Lewellen of Vale. Also surviving are 21 grandchildren, 21 great-grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Ida Evans of Olympia.

Mrs. Klinkenberg succumbed June 14, 1961. Her parents, one brother and a sister also preceded her. Klinkenberg in death.

Burial was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Pallbearers were relatives of the deceased.
