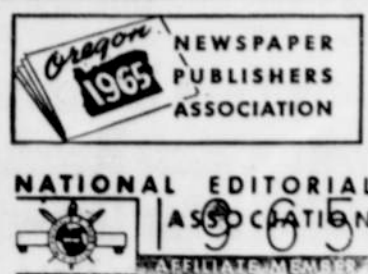

Accident Claims
Nu Acres Youth:
Chapel Rites Held

Services for Gary Wesley Shaw, victim of an automobile accident, were conducted Monday afternoon, Dec. 13, 1965, at Bertelson-Lienkaemper chapel in Ontario. Officiating was the Rev. John Bullock, pastor of Nyssa Church of the Nazarene.

Mr. Shaw succumbed early last Thursday from injuries sustained when his car skidded approximately 200 yards, striking a steel signpost on the eastern outskirts of Anaconda, Mont.

Law enforcement officers reported that he was alone in the auto and apparently went to sleep while driving.

The deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Shaw of the Nu Acres community, was born Jan. 22, 1942, at Ontario and had spent the greater part of his life in the Nu Acres area.

He attended Fruitland schools and three years ago enlisted in the U. S. Navy, from which he was recently discharged. He went to Anaconda a short time ago and had been working in a smelter plant there.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by an older brother, Robert Shaw Jr. of Nu Acres.

Interment was made in Evergreen cemetery at Ontario. Active pallbearers were Tom Hoppell, Robert Chester, John Garner, Bill Dennett, Dennis Lloyd and Sam Ralston.

City Librarian Reviews New Books
Available to Patrons of Nyssa Area

According to Mrs. Max Urry, librarian, the following new volumes have recently been added for circulation at Nyssa public library.

ADULT SECTION

"Pilgrim's Progress" by John Bunyan. This immortal classic is now available in the language of the 20th century. By putting the story into modern English, Mr. Thomas has produced a work that is clearer, more easily read and understood.

"Full Fathom Five" by John Stewart Carter. Embarking on a journey of self-discovery, the narrator in this distinguished novel perceives early that the course lies behind him with the first landmarks in the identity of his dead and beloved physician father.

"Bride of Pendorric" by Victoria Holt. A spine-chilling story of a young woman who finds herself alone in a world where someone she calls husband, sister or friend is trying to kill her.

"I Will Try" by Legson Kayira. This is a thrilling story of a boy who wouldn't take "no" for an answer and the true-life first-person account of a determined young man who walked 2500 miles across his native Africa to get an American education.

"Yes, I Can" by Sammy Davis Jr. This is much more than the story of Sammy Davis, who triumphs as the world's greatest entertainer. It is the story of a one-of-a-kind man, who had the strength to live by his own rules—who would not be taught to hate back.

"Red Badge of Courage" by Stephen Crane. The author was only 24 when this story appeared and had never seen war. Yet he seemed to understand the psychology of men in battle better than those who had actually been present at armed struggles.

"Kirkland Revels" by Victoria Holt. Kirkland Revels was what they called the magnificent manor house on the Yorkshire moors. It was steeped in history and legend and mystery.

"Sarkhan" by William J. Lederer and Eugene Burdick. In the ancient kingdom of Sarkhan in Southeast Asia the abdication of King Diad is at hand. The world watches with varying degrees of understanding. What is at stake—the control of a whole subcontinent. This book is really a history of a country.

"Love Is Eternal" by Irving Stone. The master of the biographical novel has written the story of the marriage of Mary Todd and Abraham Lincoln.

"Stan Musial" by Bob Broeg. The famous baseball player's own story.

"An Ancient Enemy" by Pierre Moinot. A story of a man dedicated to revenge and what happened when at last he faced an ancient enemy.

"That Callahan Spunk" by Francis Ames. Much of Montana in 1908 was frontier country, sparsely settled and as wild as the wolves that roamed the buttes, but this was a land rich with promise, too, and John Conway had brought his family west, from a rocky New England farm, filled with high hopes and ambitions—and Callahan spunk.

"Italy" by Denis Mack Smith. This is the University of Michigan history of the modern world edited by Allan Nevins and Howard M. Ehrmann.

"The White House Years—Waging Peace" by Dwight D. Eisenhower. A personal account of the years 1956 to 1961.

"Men of Peace" by Bradford Smith. Fifteen men are in this gallery. They range from the joyous young Pharaoh Ikhnaton down to the 20th-century man whose influence, the author says, will stretch far into the future.

"Sam Ward" by Lately Thomas. The story of one of America's most versatile and fascinating sons.
