

OTR Reaffirms Stand That County Violated State Budgeting Law

accordance with the Local Budget Law (ORS 294-).

2. At every step of the way, we kept Judge White informed of our analysis and findings. On October 15th we sent a letter to Judge White informing him of our findings, and requesting his comments. A response was not received until November 28th.

3. Local publicity has apparently centered on use of emergency funds for highway purposes. It must be emphasized, however, that other than "emergency revenues" were spent without proper budget authorization. During the last year under audit, for example, the road fund budget was overspent \$92,000, of which but only about one-third represented emergency or disaster grants. The balance came from unbudgeted increases in normal revenues, and unbudgeted cash balances. When such are spent, the supplemental budget procedure is required.

Other Unbudgeted Spending

4. The OTR review also revealed that unbudgeted expenditures took place in the county's general fund, as well as the county fair fund.

5. Despite local statements to the contrary, the expenditure of public funds without proper budget authorization (except for limited emergency grants), is a clear infraction of several Oregon statutes, including the Local Budget Law.

6. The statement of Commissioner Flock that we "fooled" him into believing we represented the state tax office is absurd. . . . After 30 years of operation in the state, Oregon Tax Research is sufficiently well known so that it neither needs nor desires any identification with the State Tax Commission.

7. We have privately and publicly stated, on many occasions, our highest regard for Judge White as a county official. But we obviously cannot predicate our fiscal analysis and findings in any situation on personal friendship.
