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... for your appliances, car, TV, etc., where you can find them. Make yourself a file box for this purpose. If you have trouble and need service, check your warranty again to see if it's still in force. The length of time will vary with the item.

Know what your warranty covers. Sometimes only parts and not labor are included. Some parts of an appliance may be guaranteed longer than others. The warranty is usually void if repairs are made by an unauthorized person, or if it has been misused. Read it carefully before you buy.

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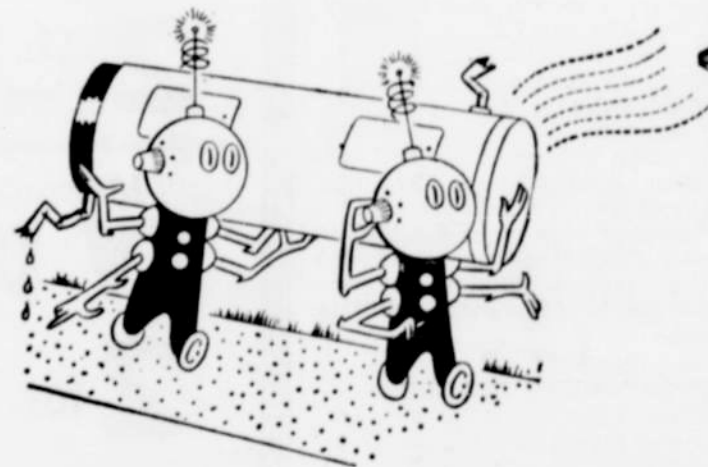
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
