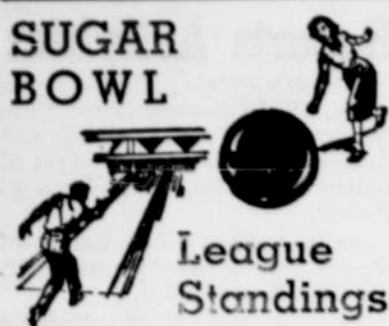

FLBA of Ontario Slates Annual Meet Feb. 2 at Payette

Mark Moorman, Cassia county, Idaho, farmer and a director of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, will be featured speaker at the annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Land Bank Association of Ontario.

Dan Roberts, manager of the Ontario association, said the annual meeting will be held at the American Legion hall in Payette Wednesday, Feb. 2, starting at 12 noon.

A native of Idaho, Moorman attended Willamette university in Salem, Ore. With his father, he operates 1,900 acres of irrigated and diversified farm land and also manages an additional 700 acres. The Moormans maintain a band of breeding ewes and have facilities for feeding 6,500 lambs a year.

Moorman is vice president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Burley, a director of the research committee of the Idaho Cattle Feeders association, secretary-treasurer of the Cassia Irrigation district and a member of the Cassia county agent's farm advisory committee.

Roberts said another feature of his association's annual meeting will be the election of two directors to succeed Tom Burns of Ontario and R. H. Howland of Cambridge, whose terms are expiring.
