Mrs. Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist at Oregon State university, says that questions like this for which he really has no choice, only frustrate the child and discourage him from making decisions. A good rule to follow would be to give a choice only if you're willing to accept his decision.

Just how should the situation be handled? Mrs. Frasier suggests these alternatives: "It's time to wash your hands" or "Wash your hands and then you'll be ready to eat."

WHAT ABOUT COLD WATER DETERGENTS?
