JV Wrestlers Place Third in Invitational Meet at Cambridge

Nyssa junior varsity wrestling team scored 55 points, earning third place in an invitational mat match held Saturday at Cambridge high school.

McCall-Donnelly wrestlers won first with 109 points, followed by Bishop Kelly high of Boise with a score of 68. Cambridge placed fourth with 54 points.

Among individual champions was Nyssan Sammy Cleaver in the 136-pound division.

FARM BUREAU FURROW

In spite of rosy reports issued by Secretary of Labor Wirtz with regard to the crops produced and harvested in California, the termination of the Bracero program did have a serious impact on California agriculture.

The California Crop and Livestock Reporting service disclosed that there was a reduction of 42,000 acres in land devoted to vegetables and melons. The report shows a drop of \$55 million in the value of all crops. Vegetable acreage was the lowest since 1961.

According to Ward Henderson, chief of the reporting service, plantings have generally shifted from high labor-use crops to mechanized field crops with new crop records this year in grain sorghum and alfalfa hay.

Some losses estimated by Henderson are: 12 million pounds of asparagus, \$1.8 million; 9.5 million pounds of Brussels sprouts, \$1.8 million; and 25.2 million pounds of strawberries, \$5.62 million.

These losses were reported for crops not harvested and are in addition to the losses because of a reduction in acreage caused by the anticipated labor shortage. Lower grades and dockage due to deterioration and inexperienced workers as well as higher labor costs were also factors.

The report also indicated local labor shortages in the deciduous and citrus fruit harvest. Lemon harvest lagged well behind the usual schedule, resulting in some grower losses. Statistics show a reduction of 2.5 million boxes, a \$7.6 million loss to the lemon industry. Earlier Sunkist growers had indicated losses of over \$1 million in ex-

ports sales due to the labor shortages.

Al Tieburg, California employment director, recently stated that only very good breaks with the weather prevented disastrous losses during 1965. In his opinion, the secretary of labor placed "harsh and impractical restrictions" on the use of foreign workers last season.
