After he failed to appear for his usual church and lodge meetings, friends attempted to contact him and got no response so relatives and law officials were summoned.

Mr. Kratzberg was born Aug. 23, 1900, in Douglas county, Kan., the fourth child of Joseph P. and Emma Kratzberg. In November 1911, the family moved to the Parma area. He grew up in that community and attended schools at Parma and Wilder, Idaho.

He was married to Anna Henderson Feb. 8, 1939, in Payette and they soon moved to the Nyssa area where Mr. Kratzberg spent the remainder of his lifetime farming and working at the sugar factory.

The deceased was an active member of the Nyssa Christian church, serving in the capacity of deacon. He was also a member of the Parma Odd Fellows lodge and an associate member of Gate City IOOF lodge, Nyssa.

Services for Earle Sample, a Treasure Valley newspaperman for many years, were conducted Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 2, 1966, at Shaffer Memory chapel in Payette.

Mr. Sample, recipient of the Idaho Press association's master editor award, succumbed Sunday at an Ontario hospital following an extended illness.

He was born Feb. 18, 1892, in Ronald, Wash., and began his newspaper career as a reporter and advertising salesman at Blackfoot, Idaho. He began working on the Weiser Signal in 1919, served for 25 years as publishing partner and managing editor and in 1944 sold his interests in that publication due to ill health.

The deceased had resided in Payette since 1943, where he was editor and co-publisher of the Independent-Enterprise and in 1963 was forced into semi-retirement because of failing health. He remained active in the field of journalism and for a short time served as advertising manager of the Ontario Argus-Observer.

Mr. Sample was a charter member of the Weiser Lions club, also a member of the Masonic lodge, Kiwanis club and Sigma Delta Chi, a national journalism fraternity. He was affiliated with the Episcopal church.

He is survived by his widow, Marie Sample, whom he married in 1923 at Seattle, and one son, Donald Sample of Wheaton, Md. Also surviving are two sisters and two granddaughters.
