

Bulldogs Defeat Meridian, Payette; Set Homecoming Game With Savages

The mighty Bulldogs have had a good week, winning two of their three basketball games. They scored victories over Meridian and Payette, beating the Warriors 68-60 and the Pirates by a 62-44 final tally. Their loss was to the Emmett Huskies 74-61 in a Friday contest.

Emmett took the lead away from the Bulldogs early in the first quarter and held on to it the remainder of the game. At the end of the first period, the Huskies led by seven points with a score of 16-9. They increased their lead in the second quarter and led at half-time by a score of 33-24.

The Idaho five continued to increase their lead in the third period to a score of 56-34. At one time the Huskies led by 28 points. The Bulldogs fought hard in the fourth quarter, outscoring their opponents by nine points, giving the league-leading Huskies a 13-point advantage when the final buzzer sounded.

High point man for the Nyssa team was Terry Oft with 18. He was followed by John Moore, 10; Dick Finger, 7; Brad Maxfield, 6; Paul Smit, 5; Neal Bohannon, 4; Paul House and Mike Kodama, 2 each; and Gene Brown, 1 point.

Shatter Meridian's Hopes

Nyssa hosted the Meridian Warriors Saturday night and shattered their guests' hopes for a part of the SRV-A league title by defeating them 68-60.

The Warriors bolted to a 15-11 first quarter lead but were overtaken by the Bulldogs 27-26 at halftime. Nyssa increased its lead to 45-36 at the end of the third quarter and added 23 more points before the final buzzer sounded.

Cousins John and Tom Moore led the Bulldog scoring with 16 and 11 points, respectively, followed by Paul Smit with 10 counters. Other Nyssa points were added by Finger, 8; Maxfield, 7; Brown and Oft, 6 each; and Kodama, 4.

Sink Pirates 62-44

The Bulldogs were really clicking Tuesday night when they played host to the Pirates from Payette. The boys in blue and white took an early lead and were ahead by 17 points at the end of the first quarter. The Pirates had narrowed the margin to eight points at halftime. Nyssa made a good comeback and led 45-31 at the end of the third stanza.

Paul Smit led the Bulldog attack with 18 points, topping all scorers. He was followed closely by John Moore and Oft with 16 and 15 points, respectively. Other scores were made by Finger, 4; Brown, Bohannon, Tom Moore, Kodama, 2 each; Maxfield, 1.

Nyssa will host the Enterprise Savages Saturday evening in their Homecoming game and travel to Ontario next Tuesday evening to battle the Tigers on their home court.
