American Traffic Death Rate Down But Toll Still Considered as 'Terrible'

The accident toll on American highways continues to increase at an alarming pace but the death rate per million miles traveled was down in 1964, compared to 1954.

There were 6.4 deaths per 100 million miles traveled in 1954, compared to 5.7 in 1964. Major Paul Johnson of the Washington State Patrol reported Feb. 11 at the Northwest Roads and Streets conference at Oregon State university.

The toll is terrible though, Johnson noted.

"If today is an average day, 131 persons will die in traffic accidents in our nation; 27,648 people will be hospitalized from traffic accidents and property damage will amount to \$500 per second."

Improved Highways Cut Toll

Engineering, education and enforcement are the tools in reducing the accident problem, he said. New highways, improved traffic control methods and modification of older highways have done much to reduce the death rate, Johnson observed.

"When we speak of traffic law enforcement, many people think only of restraint and the trooper or officer issuing an arrest citation," Johnson said.

But the courts, the motor vehicle department, the accident prevention division and public support all play a part in an effective traffic law enforcement program, he continued.

Few Appreciate Enforcement

"Traffic law enforcement is not a popular vocation. In my 30 years of traffic law enforcement, I believe I could count on my fingers the number of violators who actually appreciated the need for good traffic law enforcement," the veteran officer said.

The leading accident-causing violations include driving while intoxicated, following too closely, failure to yield the right-of-way and speeds too fast for conditions, Johnson pointed out.

These violations "are not the easiest to detect or prove in court, but they must get more attention," he emphasized.

Citations must be directed toward the violations that are causing the accident problem, Johnson concluded.
