Navy Seaman Stephen B. Poindexter, ward of Charles B. Leedy of rural Nyssa, participated in the Project Apollo AS-201 mission, according to a USN news release. He was a member of the crew aboard the destroyer, USS Waldron, a unit of Task Force 140.

Waldron occupied a downrange recovery station during the sub-orbital ballistic shot which initiated the program slated to put men on the moon by 1970.

Special equipment was installed on the Waldron to facilitate handling of the unmanned spacecraft.

Her crew has undergone training in spacecraft recovery since her selection for this mission.
