#### Attend Birthday Party

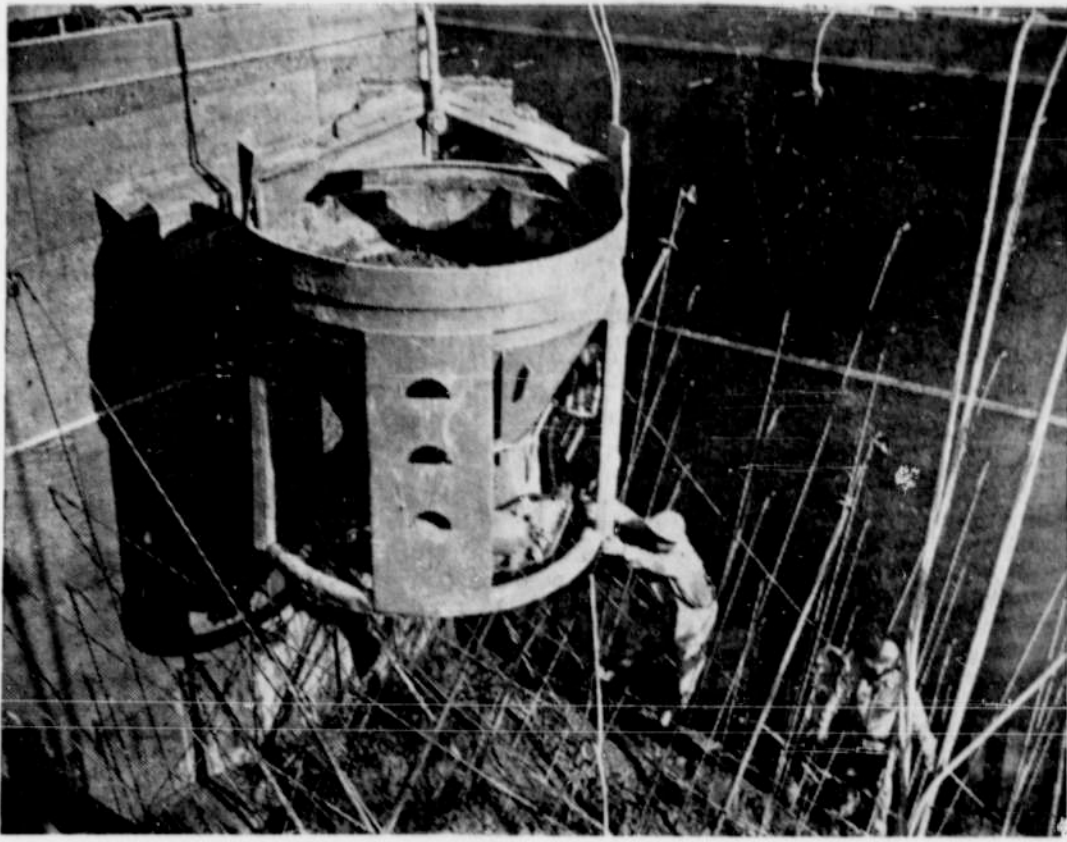

CONCRETE NOW IS POURING into place for the dam and powerhouse at Idaho Power company's 425,000-kilowatt Hells Canyon project in North America's deepest gorge. The first of it, poured from a huge bucket in the manner shown here, was placed Saturday, March 5, during a historic ceremony attended by T. E. Roach, the utility's president, and other officials. Between now and 1968, when the project will be completed and in full power production, a total of 800,000 cubic yards of concrete will be poured

for the giant structures. This total requirement is enough concrete to build a two-lane highway 341 miles long, or about the distance between Nyssa and Ogden, Utah. Lowering the buckets of concrete into pouring position will be three massive cranes, traveling on rails atop a trestle stretched across the narrow gorge. As seen in this view, the initial pourings are taking place in the depths of a yawning excavation dug more than 100 feet below the dry riverbed to reach foundation bedrock.
