(Continued From Page 1) all members of the panel strangers to the couple. In setting up conferences, the secretary checks each member to be sure none are acquainted with the couple.

In the small city populations of the west, several communities pool their efforts. This is what has been done in the Vale, Ontario and Nyssa area, making it possible to insure anonymity by referring couples to an out-of-town panel.

**Couples Must Cooperate**

One session before a panel seems to be sufficient, except on rare occasions. Obviously, the success of these panels depends to a great extent on the willingness of the couple to attempt to make changes, backed by a mutual desire to restore meaningful marital relations.

On the other hand, experience with this approach to "marriage counseling" has shown that in a number of cases, success has been achieved in spite of great skepticism and doubt on the part of one or both persons involved.
