

Hunting and Fishing License Sales Continue to Boom Upward in Oregon

The number of hunters and fishermen in Oregon continued to boom upward, going well over the three-quarter million mark in 1965.

Phil Schneider, state game director, announced that sale of hunting and fishing licenses totaled almost 820,500 compared with 782,400 in 1964. Schneider said that at this rate of increase, the number of hunters and fishermen in Oregon could easily reach the million mark by 1970.

Schneider advised that the total sales will probably be a little higher than the figures shown here since some receipts are still in the hands of license dealers.

According to receipts to date, anglers licensed to fish in Oregon water, including 136,735 combination holders, numbered just over 429,000, compared with 411,000 the previous year. This is an increase of about 18,000 in the sale of regular angling licenses from 1964.

Certain Licenses Not Included

The above figure does not include the daily angling licenses (since fishermen may have purchased one or more of these licenses) or the salmon-steelhead punch card which is supplemental to a regular angling license.

Schneider advised that the sale of daily angling licenses shows a large increase over 1964 with more than 195,300 daily permits issued compared with 174,300 the preceding year.

About 7,200 hunters were added to the ranks in 1965 as revealed by more than 332,800 license holders, including combination licenses, compared with 325,600 in 1964. Deer hunters had a little more competition afield, as shown by the issuance of just over 278,000 deer tags compared with 271,000 the preceding year.

Elk Hunters on Increase

Elk hunting also attracted a record number of hunters with just over 4,500 new members trying this rugged game. Receipts show more than 67,400 elk tags issued for the 1965 season compared with 63,000 the previous year. Ten years ago around 29,000 elk hunters participated.

Remaining big game tag sales include 5,544 controlled area deer

tags, 680 antelope tags, 291 turkey tags, six bighorn sheep tags and five Rocky Mountain goat tags.

Schneider advised that the total license sales does not reflect a true picture of the number of hunters and fishermen in the state. No license is required by anyone to fish for non-game fish including marine species. The director also advised that landowners may hunt or fish on their own property without licenses, except for salmon, steelhead and big game.

In addition, youngsters under the age of 14 are not required to have licenses to fish or hunt, except for big game.
