Strom Participates In Joint Exercises By French-U.S. Navies

Yeoman Seaman Jerry D. Strom participated in "Fairgame IV," a recent joint French-United States naval training exercise in the western Mediterranean and in Corsica, according to a U. S. Navy news release.

The young sailor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Strom of route 1, Nyssa, was a crew member aboard the guided missile frigate USS Leahy.

Fairgame is conducted annually between U. S. Sixth Fleet and French naval forces to provide tactical training in conducting air, amphibious and naval operations, as well as defense methods against them.

The three-phase exercise began with U. S. and French carrier task forces training in combined support operations. Participating French and U. S. air and submarine forces provided mock opposition to the carriers.

Phase two consisted of individual ship exercises in which U. S. and French observers were exchanged for orientation and indoctrination.

The final phase of Fairgame was a two-nation amphibious landing at Santa Manza, Corsica, supported by a fast carrier task force and opposed by French and U. S. submarine, land and air forces.

Number of Dairy Cows in State Drops To 50-Year Low; 1965 Production Same

Oregon's milk cow population dropped to the lowest figure in 50 years during 1965, but January's milk production remained the same as a year earlier at 63 million pounds.

Stephen C. Marks, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist, said cow numbers decreased 10,000 head last year, the largest number change since 1957. The remaining 140,000 head on Oregon's dairy farms at the start of 1966 numbered less than half that of the early 1940's.

Marks noted that replacement dairy stock is also scarcer this year. Heifers numbered only 38,000 at the start of January and heifer calves were down to 52,000 head.

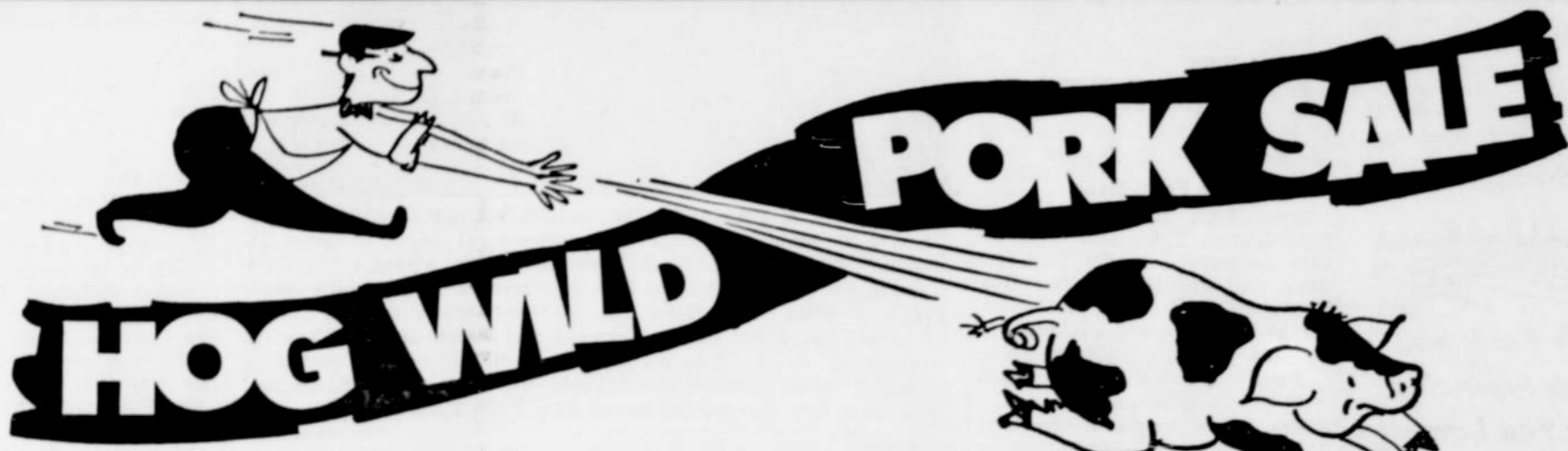
Oregon's milk flow dropped below 1 billion pounds for the first time last year. Total output came to 977 million pounds. A record high production per cow of 7,570 pounds was reported.

Practically all states recorded decreases in milk cow numbers with a national reduction to 16.6 million head. Milk production fell nearly 2 billion pounds short of the 1964 record of 127 billion pounds.
