

Oregon Vehicle Registrations Total 1,228,156 for 1965

Oregon motor vehicle registrations at the end of 1965 totaled 1,228,156, an increase of 5.9 percent over 1964. Vern L. Hill, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, announced recently. This meant that another 68,873 vehicles joined the Oregon traffic stream during the year. Hill noted that the rate of increase last year was not quite as great as in 1964 when a 6.2 percent registration gain over 1963 was recorded. Registrations over the past five years, he added, have increased nearly 27 percent.

A breakdown of registrations shows 1,027,841 passenger cars, 1,880 buses, 71,342 trucks, 90,073 trailers, 3,585 fixed loads and 33,435 motorcycles.

Motorcycles again showed a big gain, 13.7 percent more than in 1964, but the rate of increase was lower than in other recent years.

The department, Hill said, collected \$21,068,843 for all types of registration and driver licensing transactions in 1965.

Moneys collected are earmarked for the highway fund, except for department expenditures.

School Lunches Subsidized
School Clerk Dirick Nedry told the group that if federal subsidies for the hot lunch program were eliminated, the cost would increase \$10,000 and price of meals would have to be increased by approximately 25 percent.

Board President Larson said one item rejected by the board was health and accident insurance for teachers. This would have cost an additional \$5,000 for all employees.

Father of Nyssan Dies in Caldwell; Monday Rites Held

Funeral rites for William F. Corn of rural Nampa were conducted Monday afternoon, March 28, 1966, at Peckham-Dakan-Davis chapel in Caldwell, with the Rev. Ron DeGraaf officiating. Interment was made in Dry Creek cemetery near Boise.

The deceased, father of Fay Corn of Nyssa, succumbed last Thursday in a Caldwell hospital. He was born June 30, 1883, in Sedalia, Mo., and at the age of seven years, traveled to the Boise valley in a covered wagon with his parents.

On Oct. 22, 1902, he was married to Amanda Hitson in Boise. They farmed near Emmett, Payette and in Eastern Malheur county until 1944 when they moved to the Nampa area. Mr. Corn was a member of the Baptist church.

In addition to his widow and son, Fay of Nyssa, he is survived by two other sons, Jack of Nampa and Ross Corn of Ontario; three daughters, Mrs. Mildred Taylor of Medford, Ore., Mrs. Esther Weldon of Burley, Idaho, and Mrs. Mary Osborn of Norwalk, Calif.

Rep. Robert F. Smith (R-Burns), majority leader and speaker pro tem of the 1965 Legislature, has filed for the seat in the House of Representatives from the 26th district representing Malheur and Harney counties. Rep. Smith has been a member of the House for the past three sessions.

At the present time Smith is chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on Public Lands and a member of the Congressional Public Land Law Review commission. Rep. Smith has been an active member of the Harney and National Cattlemen's associations and has been active in chamber of commerce affairs.

In 1957 he was selected Junior First Citizen and in 1961 was honored as one of the three outstanding young men in Oregon.

In his announcement, Smith said: "The forthcoming legislative session must make serious decisions on many problems concerning property tax relief, public land use, recreation and water resources, and the field of education. I hope to participate in these decisions in behalf of the people of Malheur and Harney counties."

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

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
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
