

Driver Unhurt In Truck Upset

Ed Mason, driver of Nyssa Co-op Supply's fuel truck, escaped uninjured when he was forced off the road and his vehicle upset Monday of last week.

Mason was traveling west on Cow Hollow road about 1/2 mile beyond Sunset Market when he noted a passenger car coming toward him in the middle of the pavement. He said he kept pulling over to the right, thinking the oncoming car would return to the proper side of the road, but when it did not he took the shoulder and turned the truck over on its side.

The other vehicle, occupied by two young boys and having a light-colored license, stopped after the truck upset. But as soon as they saw Mason push a door up to get out, left without further ado.

The truck was loaded with gasoline and diesel fuel at the time, but its speed had been cut enough that damage was held to approximately \$1,000. Insurance covers the major portion of the loss.

Paul R. Wynn Rites Conducted March 26 At LDS Stake Center

Mr. Wynn succumbed the previous Wednesday morning at the Preston home of a daughter, Mrs. Keith Gooch, following an extended illness.

He was born Sept. 18, 1899, at Lyons, Kan., a son of George B. and Cora E. Straight Wynn. He married Mary Ellen Hemsley on Sept. 22, 1921, in the Salt Lake City temple.

The family resided in Preston for 21 years, during which time Mr. Wynn operated a hardware store. He continued in the hardware business at Ashton and also farmed there before moving to the Nyssa area where he ranched for 14 years. Mr. Wynn and his wife returned to Preston in October 1965.

The deceased was an active member of the LDS church, having served in the bishopric of Preston Fourth ward, as president and counselor in the Oneida stake and as a member of the stake high council.

While residing at Ashton, he was superintendent of the stake Sunday school board and was active in missionary work of the stake.
