WHILE RECENTLY LOOKING through his collection of photographs, Nyssan Laurence Hansen came across these two taken in early April 1952. He was working as a section hand for the Union Pacific Railroad company and snapped the pictures near Owyhee junction. They tell the story of the rampageous Owyhee river and flooded surroundings. The photo on the left shows a portion of the railroad track left hanging above the water after the dirt underneath it was washed away. Hansen said the train was halted

for approximately six weeks. He noted also, that there had been a cow trail leading under the track and to the left of the large board extending from the poles. The picture on the right was taken at the same location and time, but from above. The flood of 14 years ago was caused by an excessive amount of moisture running into Owyhee reservoir from the watersheds above, with these pictures showing results of the overflow. This situation was quite different from this year's predicted small watershed runoff.

The former statute stipulates that any public official expending money in excess of legal appropriations is personally liable; the latter statute provides that it is unlawful to spend public funds unless the Budget Law has been complied with.

The taxes of our property owners are already burdensome. I will not permit expenditures of tax monies unless it is shown that such monies are spent wisely and in the right place. If the people want to spend larger sums of money, they have the right to do so, but their voice should be expressed at an election, instead of the County Court quietly overspending unauthorized money, and imposing greater tax burdens on our people. If I am elected as your Commissioner, I will work diligently toward this.

Taxes must come down! I have been a taxpayer in Malheur County since 1918, and it is with a voice of experience that I know the present rates of spending the people's money for taxes are beyond reason for the property owner to continue paying. The County needs the help of capable controllers of the spending.

If I am elected as your Commissioner, I will apply ordinary common sense and business judgment to County problems, with fairness to one and all. I do not believe in playing "fast and loose" with the taxpayers' money.
