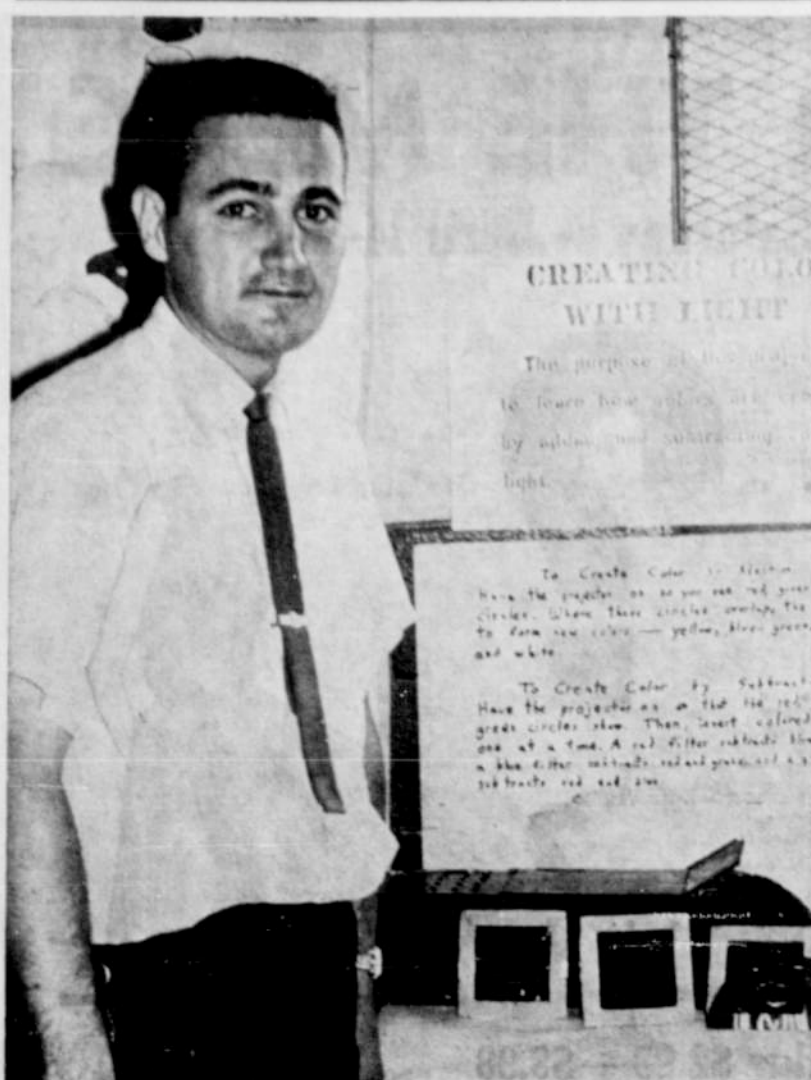

## IT'S YOUR LAW

### A Child Is Tripped

Ida, age 13, was in the post office to buy some stamps when she tripped over an empty mail sack a postal employee had carelessly left in the aisle.

She fell and was seriously hurt. Her accident happened on June 12, 1965. About 2½ years later, in December 1967, her mother, as Ida's guardian, filed a suit against the United States under the federal tort claims act, asking damages for the injuries Ida suffered.

The federal tort claims act provides that claims for damages against the United States must be filed within two years of the time of the injury or the claim will be barred.

Ida's mother said she had a right to sue for her daughter after two years had passed because a

statute of limitations barring the claims of minors does not expire until the child is of age.

Do you think Ida's mother is right? Can she successfully sue the United States for the negligence of a postman more than two years after she was injured?

In such a lawsuit the court said Ida's claim was filed too late. The U.S. cannot be sued at all except with the government's consent. The federal tort claims act, which gives permission for persons to sue the government, provides that such suits must be filed within two years.

There are no special provisions for minors to wait longer than two years before suing the United States, even though as a general rule a statute of limitation does not bar a minor from bringing a suit against others. In a suit against the government, a minor has no more rights than a person of age, as far as a statute of limitations is concerned.
