Malheur river near Drewsey is forecast at 34,000 acre feet or 42 percent average.

Statewide, the outlook for spring and summer water supplies in Oregon now ranges from "very good" in the western half of the state to "poor" in scattered eastern Oregon areas in Umatilla, Union, Baker, Malheur, Grant, Wheeler, Crook, Harney and Lake counties. Carryover water supplies will "save the day" for many eastern Oregon irrigators.

The next evaluation of water supply conditions will be made about May 9 from snow surveys and other data.
