

Bulldogs Shut Out Vale in First Win; Lose Boise Games

Nyssa's Bulldogs managed only one hit Thursday, April 14, but still shut out the Vale Vikings 2-0.

Nyssa crossed home plate twice in the fifth inning for the only scores of the ball game. Both Jim Anderson and Brad Burningham received walks. Gene Brown sacrificed, advancing both men. Anderson then scored on a high throw to first base and Burningham squeezed in on a wild pitch.

Danny Wilson pitched a four-hitter to earn the win.

Nyssa's lone hit came in the first inning when Gary Mason hit a stand-up double.

Vale scored no runs on four hits and two errors, compared with Nyssa's one hit and one error.

The Bulldogs traveled to Boise Saturday afternoon for a non-conference double-header with Capital high and were defeated by one run in both contests. Final score was 14-13 for the first encounter and the scoreboard read 6-5 at the end of the second game.

Nyssa will travel to Bishop Kelly in Boise on Friday and will host the Vallive Falcons next Tuesday afternoon.

Lakes Promise Good Fishing

Best trout angling prospects in the La Grande-Wallowa area are expected in the impoundments, Morgan lake, Unity, Higgins and Murray reservoirs should all produce excellent rainbow angling. Roads are good.

Most streams in the area are reported high and murky. Upper Imnaha river may be blocked by snow, and anglers will have to go over the snowbanks to reach most lakes in the Wallowas. If streams are in shape, suggested are Catherine creek, Grande Ronde, Eagle creek and Pine creek as possible choices. The Burnt river below Unity should also be a good one.

Southeastern Oregon

Stream angling in southeastern Oregon will also depend on the spring thaw—good if streams are right, poor if snow melts turns them off color. Fish lake is snow-bound and frozen over, and the Steens mountain streams are generally inaccessible. Roads into Campbell, Deadhorse, Loftin and Cottonwood Meadows are plugged with snow.

Anglers heading for Moon reservoir can expect slow to fair angling, but the rainbows caught may be anywhere up to 20 inches in length. Chickahominy continues good for rainbows to 16 inches. Access is good into Krumbo and trout angling should be fair. Delinment is frozen over and a complete winter kill is again expected.

Harney Fishing Fair

Streams in Harney county which should produce include the Blitzen, Silver creek, Emigrant creek and Bear creek. All streams are somewhat high and muddy but will be stocked. Home, Trout and Willow creeks should be fair.

The road to Malheur reservoir is good and fine trout fishing is expected if weather is suitable. Rainbows to 18 inches are available at Beulah. Access is fair into Cow lakes as long as the weather remains dry. Rainbows from 6 to 22 inches are being taken. Good access is reported into Antelope reservoir with angling predicted fair. The Owyhee is improving for crappie.

The Logan valley area of Malheur river is generally inaccessible because of snow. Main Malheur is muddy and high, but anglers should do well on bait. Malheur South Fork is expected excellent. Access is good and water conditions ideal.

Plantings in Area Listed

Since April 1 plantings of three-inch trout have been made as follows: Antelope reservoir, 100,000; Bully Creek, 25,000; Malheur reservoir, 177,000.

Also to have been planted Monday of this week were 3,000 ten-inch trout in Owyhee river, according to the game commission report of April 11.

Included in the report was a note that yellow perch that originated in Warm Springs reservoir were reproducing in Bully Creek reservoir naturally now and taking food intended for trout. This along with the detrimental effects of the late flood are responsible for the poor trout showing, stated Larry Bisbee, aquatic biologist for the commission.

Powder Puff Game Set Friday Evening

The long-postponed powder puff basketball game between high school GAA members and townswomen will be played at 8 o'clock Friday evening, April 22, in the high school gymnasium. The contest is sponsored by the Girls' Athletic association and was previously scheduled for March 11 but was postponed due to an outbreak of flu in the area.

Following the Friday night game, a girl-ask-boy sock hop is planned at the high school.
