Teacher Submits Item On Departmentalized Teaching, Grades 4-6

(This item is reprinted from Samuel M. Goodman's "Report on a Research of Departmentalized Organization in Elementary Grades 4-6," Montgomery county public schools, Rockville, Maryland, May 1965. It was submitted for Journal publication by Mrs. Zette Bumgarner, Nyssa fourth grade teacher.)

"Does departmentalization help achievement in grades 4 to 6?"

No, according to a study carried out in the public schools of Montgomery county, in which seven schools providing departmentalized teaching in grades 4 and 6 were carefully matched with seven others having self-contained class organization.

Standardized achievement tests administered after a three-year trial showed the pupils in the self-contained classes to have higher achievement scores in both reading and mathematics.

Differences between the two groups of schools in science and social studies were not significant. The biggest differences in achievement were among students with lower intelligence test scores; the advantages of the self-contained classroom were most evident for these students.

ANK Club Schedules Saturday Plant Sale

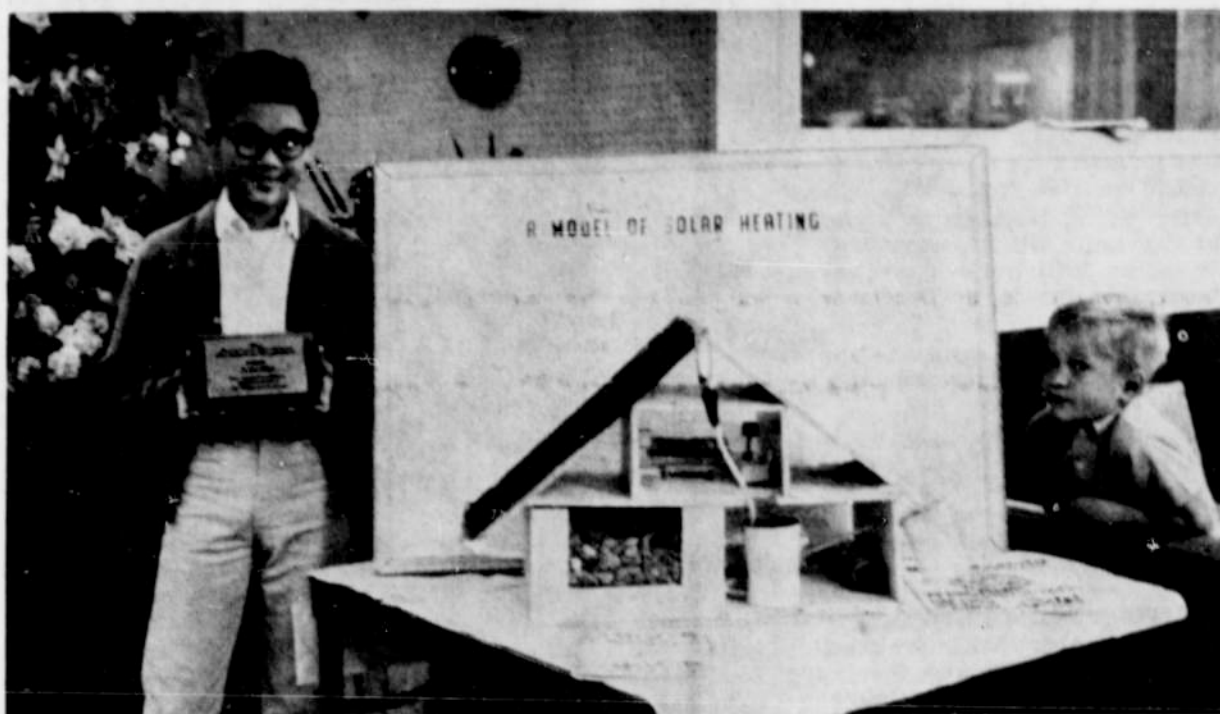

Chapel Services to Be Held Friday For Mabel White, Victim of Accident

Funeral services for Mrs. Sheff (Mabel) White, victim of a Sunday afternoon auto mishap, will be conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, April 22, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa. Officiating will be the Rev. Ted Mayberry of Ontario First Baptist church, and interment will be made in the Nyssa cemetery.

Mrs. White, who was born July 8, 1894 in Kentucky, was killed in a collision of two cars driven by her husband and 18-year-old Allen Turner of Ontario. The accident occurred at approximately 3:30 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of King avenue and highway 20-26, north of Nyssa.

Oregon State Police said the White auto was struck broadside when it pulled onto the highway in front of the oncoming Turner car. The officers reported that the White vehicle knocked down the King avenue road sign and came to rest in a ditch.

Men Reported Improved

Mr. White and the Turner youth were both taken to Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario. The former is reported to be in fair condition after suffering multiple chest injuries, facial lacerations and a possible skull fracture. Young Turner was reported in satisfactory condition. He also

suffered head lacerations and possible fractured skull.

In addition to Mr. White of the home in the Arcadia community, the deceased is survived by one son, Orland White, also of the Arcadia area; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Among six surviving brothers and sisters is Mrs. Henry Lissman of Ontario. A son, Joe, preceded Mrs. White in death.

A complete obituary will be published in next week's issue of the Journal.

Hina Kodama Rites To Be Held Friday At Buddhist Church

Funeral services for Mrs. Hina Kodama of Portland will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon, April 21, 1966, at the Buddhist church in Ontario, with interment to be made in a Portland cemetery. Wake services were conducted last evening at the Ontario church.

Services are under direction of Lienkaemper chapel of Nyssa with the Rev. Tetsunen Hirota officiating.

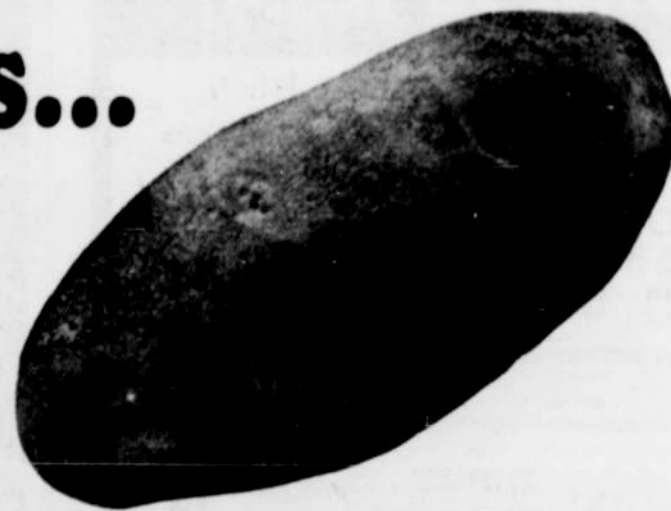


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
