

## Lloyd Tobler Dies of Heart Attack; Chapel Rites to Be Held Tomorrow

Services for Lloyd Leone Tobler will be conducted at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, May 13, 1966, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister will be Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church, with vocal selections by Mrs. Dwight (June Marie) Wyckoff.

Mr. Tobler succumbed at approximately 2 o'clock Monday morning at his home, after suffering a third, but sudden heart attack. He was stricken with previous attacks on Feb. 12 and Feb. 22 this year.

He was born Oct. 18, 1893, at Spring Valley, Minn., a son of Jessie and Katherine Weber Tobler. He was graduated from Spring Valley high school in 1912 and studied at the Methodist-affiliated Hamlin university in St. Paul.

On April 7, 1917, he was united in marriage to Verna Mason at Spring Valley. They farmed in the Shell Lake area of Wisconsin for 30 years and in March 1947, moved to Nyssa.

At that time, Mr. Tobler and his son, Hugh, took over management of the Al Thompson Feed store. Since 1956, when the store was sold, he continued in the broiler business with his son, Evan, until a short time before his death.

### Had Outdoor Hobbies

The deceased was a lifetime active member of the Methodist church, and by his family he was considered a wonderful husband and father. His favorite hobbies were camping and fishing.

In addition to his widow of the home at 609 Park avenue, he is survived by three sons, William Lloyd of Flint, Mich., Hugh Jessie of Wayzata, Minn., and Evan G. Tobler of Nyssa. Also surviving are six grandchildren, four adopted grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
