Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

NEWLYWEDS SPEND ABOUT \$3 MORE PER PERSON

. . . per week for groceries than other families, says Mary Holt-house, extension food marketing specialist at Oregon State university. A recent survey at supermarkets brought out this fact.

You can save up to \$25 a month with these tips. First, study the store ads; keep an eye out for specials. Compare brands for quality and prices.

Buy fruits and vegetables when they're in season. Most newspapers are good sources of information on currently plentiful foods which are economically priced.

Since meat takes a sizeable slice of the budget, compare cost per serving of various cuts. You can learn appetizing ways of cooking the cheaper cuts and how much to buy for a serving from our extension bulletin, "Good Eating With Beef." DO YOU HAVE A CHILD

. . . some household scales and the question, "What can I do now?"

If so, put them all together, says Mrs. Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist at Oregon State university. The result can be a happy play time plus a learning experience.

A four- or five-year-old can find lots of things around the house to weigh. Although he can't read the weights, he will get the idea that some things are light and some are heavy.

YOUR ELECTRIC BLANKET

. . . has earned a vacation. Wash it before storing to keep it fresh.

Dry cleaning is NOT recommended because of possible damage to insulation around the wires. Pre-treat any spots first. Protect the plug by wrapping it with a wash cloth secured by a rubber band.

Fill washer with lukewarm water, add mild soap. Let the blanket soak for 10 minutes, then agitate for one minute. Spin for just one minute. Next, fill washer with lukewarm rinse water, agitate again for one minute and spin for a minute.

To dry, hang blanket lengthwise over two clothes lines and change position frequently so it will dry evenly. Dry in the shade, not the sun.

You can dry it in the dryer, if you're careful. Pre-heat the dryer for a few minutes before adding the blanket, plus several towels to serve as buffers. Tumble for 15 minutes, then finish drying on the line.

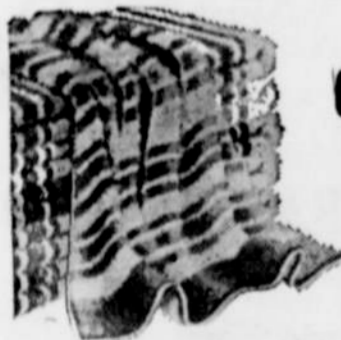
