Rep. Smith Discusses Use of Public Lands At Chamber Meeting

(3) Differing laws and regulations by federal agencies in the allowable cut in timber areas; (4) Differing policies on management of land by the same federal agencies; (5) no basis for exchange of federal and state lands whereby they could come under a common program for improvement; and (6) Rating and codifying more than 5,000 laws that have been pyramided throughout the history of the federal government.

West More Involved

Smith told the local group that the west has more to lose or gain from the study than any other area of the U.S. and that he has not arrived at any conclusions as to a formula that could or should be used as a basis of pay to local governments from use of these public lands.

He did say, however, in answer to a question from the audience, that he did feel that public lands were not sharing their part of the burden.

The study is financed by a \$4 million budget and the committee will make a final report in 1968. Due to the limited amount of time and enormity of the task, much will be done through contracts with universities, outstanding individuals in these fields and federal agencies.

Smith invited all interested persons to counsel with him on any method or arrangement that might improve Oregon's position in the public land question.

"Early Mesopotamia and Iran" by M. E. L. Mallowan. A discussion of the civilizations of Iran and Mesopotamia from 4000 BC to 2000 BC, including architecture, pottery, sculpture, the invention of writing and the metric system.
